CHICAGO, June 12.—Savage selling to put an end to loss ripped the top off the market for wheat to-day. With big shipments of the new grain heading for Kansas City, and with the harvest area rapidly widening, owners here became half frenzied when a build clique which was supposed to have closed out a load of 10,000,000 bushels accumulated in the May deal here began a fresh selling movement directed chiefly against the July delivery. The collapse of prices had come as a thoro sumprise to all except a few, Early buying on the part of the bull leaders threw the majority of speculators off guard. The fact, too, that corn and oats were advancing helped to cause a bulge in the price appear natural. Feeling of the market with offerings, however, turned loose a pandemonium. Corn displayed a great deal of important strength in the face of the wheat decline. Scarceness of rain for the last couple of days had much to do with creating bull sentiments. ferings were limited and many buynervous, but only 1-8c off at 54 5-8c. Cash grades were easy. In oats, an advance to the highest prices of the season was made, but not held, as hedging sales and profittaking combined with the break in wheat led to a setback. Trading was on a large scale, bullish crop news furnishing the incentive. Outside limits for July proved to be 38 5-8c to 38 3-4c and 37 7-8c, with the close 1-2c not higher at 38 1-2c.
