RENEWED DECLINE IN CORN AND OATS

Prospect of Return of Warm Weather Has Bearish Effect at Chicago.

Receipts of cattle on the Union Stock Yards during the week were 5067 head, of which 4100 head came on the market last Monday. In the face of these heavy deliveries the market was very active with last week's steady to strong prices well maintained. Everything was well cleaned up carly in the day and more would have been taken at the market. Fat cows were wanted, but the medium to common class of cows were not so easy to sell. The built trade has been active all thru the week and all the good fat ones cleaned up. The stocks and feeder trade was fairly strong, and we would say that the best prices of last week prevailed. Milkers and springers, where they were of good to choice quality, were quickly snapped up, but the demand for the medium to poor class of milkers and springers may be said town have been a good \$5 lower. So much for Monday's market.

On Tuesday with only 551 cattle on sale the market was active and strong with Monday.

On Wednesday there were about 1000 cattle on sale with no let up in the demand and price, but with a lot of half-fed stuff that under normal conditions would have been resold to go out on grass, but were as a matter of fact packed up for the local butcher trade.

On Thursday there were 400 cattle on market and the demand, especially in the forenoon, was good, as good as any time this year, but later on it weak-ened a trifle, or eased off, buyers being disinclined to go out and clean up the balance of the offerings. Drovers and salesmen who took advantage of the good demand to cash in made a good stroke of business, but even at that nobody can say that the prices being paid these days are not phenomenally strong. As to whether these record breaking prices will continue nobody can tell, but among the best informed and experienced cattle men the feeling is general that the men.
