

ARM OPPOSING FORCES

Proclamation Declares Determination to Remain in Fiume at Any Cost.

Rome, Sept. 23.—"If you don't rise; if you don't overthrow the government which dishonors you, you are unworthy of calling yourselves Italians." This declaration is made by Gabriele D'Annunzio in a proclamation addressed to Venice.

In an appeal addressed to Trieste, D'Annunzio says: "We are determined to remain in Fiume against any opposition, determined to starve in its streets, to be burned alive in its houses set on fire, meeting with a smile the cruelest death. Therefore, we are invincible."

Declares Fiume is Italian. Leonida Bissoni, Bergamaschi, leader of the reform socialists, and former minister of military aid and war pensions, in his address today before the congress of Italian socialists, dealing with the war, said:

"The end of the war should have meant the return to all countries of what belonged to them. In Italy, however, the war was fought and won, the chief aim being a society of nations, to which victorious Italy should have adhered by deeds and not by words."

Washington Was Informed. Washington, Sept. 23.—The Italian government was informed last July of the plans of Lieutenant Col. Gabriele D'Annunzio for his Fiume adventure, according to the Italian Socialist paper Avanti, extracts from which were cabled today from Geneva to the official information bureau here of the kingdom.

Foreign Minister Resigns. Rome, Sept. 23.—Tommaso Tittoni, Italian foreign minister, has resigned because of the Fiume incident, according to an announcement by the Giornale D'Italia.

Unrest in Paris. Paris, Sept. 23.—Unrest in Paris is growing in peace conference circles in regard to the situation in Fiume. It is feared that the movement started by Gabriele D'Annunzio may spread to other parts of the Dalmatian coast and result in the occupation of Zara, Cattaro and other towns with large Italian populations.

Foodstuffs for Fiume. Rome, Sept. 23.—Premier Nitti has arranged with the Italian Red Cross to supply Fiume with the necessary foodstuffs in order to preclude any suffering there.
