SHOES OF MURDER VICTIM.

Detective Wells Locates Maker in Lynn, Mass.

W. J. Wells, provincial detective, makes public what steps were taken to find the name of the manufacturer of the shoe worn by the Barton Township murder victim. After 17 days of inquiry he got a fairly complete list of shoe manufacturers of the United States, all of whom he communicated with by circular letter. A large number of manufacturers replied to the circular, one of whom, E. T. Ricker Shoe Co. of Lynn, Mass., replied on Jan. 7, that the "Gut Foot Queen" shoe was manufactured by them solely for Laura Fried, 116 Duane-street, New York. This was a wholesale shoe. The case number, 123, was on the shoe. The shoe was made in May, 1905. Mr. Fried wrote on Jan. 31 that the goods were sold principally on the east side of New York territory, thickly populated by Hebrews, and we presume, therefore, the letter says, "that no one would wear of these shoes was also of that race."

Altho the shoes were manufactured in Lynn, the makers of that city wrote that they never heard of the shoe before.

Mr. Wells is still working on the case. "I did not locate where the shoes were manufactured," the detective says, "but I was not working on the clue they now have," said Mr. Wells.

TWO ESTATES FILED.

The child, who was standing near the stove, was hurled across the room and two iron fragments hit her over the head and abdomen. She remained unconscious for some three hours and then came to, and after speaking a few words to her mother, expired.

The kitchen was wrecked by the explosion and flooded by the escaping water.

USED WOMEN AS SHIELDS.

Details of Fight With Moros—Others Fought as Men.

Manila, March 12.—Major General Wood, who has arrived here, announced that he assumes full responsibility for the fight against the Moros at Dajo Hill near Jolo.

WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR HOURS

Information as to Cause of Arrest Must Be Given Prisoners.

St. Petersburg, March 12.—The government has sent a circular to the governor-generals and governors of provinces instructing them that persons taken into custody for political offences must, within twenty-four hours of their arrest, be confronted with the charges and allowed to make explanations. The circular also insists that persons in the jails of political prisoners.

This step on the part of the government is the result of the tremendous outcry raised against the arbitrary action of the local authorities in arresting suspects and holding them without trial, or exiling them by administrative order.

Over 70,000 persons have been arrested in European Russia since the government entered on its active campaign against the revolutionaries.

NOT ENOUGH HEARES.

Mourners of Miss Victoria Carrying Caskets Along Roads.

Paris, March 12.—Hundreds of funerals are occurring today at the town surrounding Couriers, where the mind disaster Saturday resulted in the loss of over a thousand lives. Snow has fallen, but lines of mourners fill the roads, many of them carrying caskets as the number of hearse obtainable are insufficient.

At Billy Morangy a rough altar was erected in the open air and funeral services were conducted over sixty bodies. Another and similar service occurred at Mercourt over the unidentified dead.
