

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS FAST SERVICE DESIRED

John Patterson Tells Why He Wants Special Right of Way—No Decision Yet.

Hamilton, April 26.—(Special.)—Rev. A. E. Henry announced definitely at a meeting of the Hamilton Presbytery this afternoon that he would accept the call to Knox Church, Regina. He will preach his far-well sermon here on May 13 and expects to take charge of the Regina Church on May 27. The pulpit of Knox Church will be declared vacant on May 20.

Rearranging Things.
At the meeting of the finance committee this evening the resignation of Alex Stewart, city treasurer, was accepted, and the question of giving him retiring allowance was deferred. W. R. Lockie, the acting treasurer, was recommended for appointment as his successor, at \$2000 a year, and Ald. Mac will be appointed assistant treasurer at \$1500 a year, at the meeting of the council next Monday evening. The choice of Wednesday, August 3, as a holiday was confirmed. Herbie Barr, who six months ago was given six months' leave of absence, and who has not reported since, will be taken off the pay roll until something is heard from him.

Would Run Fast Line.
John Patterson's application for a right of way thru the city for the Hamilton, Waterloo and Great Trail way was heard by a joint meeting of the board of works and finance committee this evening. The alderman wanted to know why he could not use some of the streets now used for railways. He said the company wanted to run a fast line, and he expected to require a right of way thru Dundurn park, and the city would have to build a bridge, and will run along the rear of the park. The station will be on the west side of James-street near Vine-street, and the freight yards at the corner of Barton and Oxford-streets. Mr. Patterson expects to start construction work by May 15. He first asked the city to pay half the cost of acquiring the right of way, but will be satisfied now with an exemption from taxation for ten years. The alderman wanted to see the route staked out before coming to a definite decision.

SOCIETY AND THE HORSES HAVING A SPLENDID TIME

Some Features of Unusual Interest at the Horse Show Yesterday and Success is Assured.

Society took a tight hold on the whole of a fine day at the second official presentation of the horse show at the armories. For the first day the management says the receipts were more than 50 per cent. in advance of any previous first days, and for yesterday former records in receipts were only a little behind, but in beauty and fine feature the connoisseurs say the increase is most remarkable. No more brilliant gathering than that of last night has ever assembled in Toronto.

All day it was the same, but the winding-up not long before midnight was simply a sensation, because everyone was tangled up in the choice of the jumpers. The 6 ft. 10 in. bar is nearly a foot below the world's record, but it was a hard one for the beautiful competitors last night under the glare of the electric light and the applause of the vast throng, which could not restrain its enthusiasm without making some noise. The jumping event, scheduled for 15 minutes, lasted an hour, owing to the proficiency of the jumpers. Myopia, Miss Pepper's pretty horse, won it by a margin characterized by grace which could only be appreciated by a man who doesn't know a horse. It was a feat to the big test, on the 6 ft. 10 in. jump, the little horse trembled and looked at its rider as it was sent to the effort. Everybody cheered lustily when it made a clean jump.

But there is a bit of a joke about this exciting contest. Confidence, who may sometime become a fine jumper, thought he could make that 6 ft. 10 in. jump, and Col. Lessard was asked by the rider for the privilege.

"Go ahead," said the colonel, regarding the horse, and the jumper tried and fell over everything, even his rider and his rider.

Again it was asserted that Confidence could make the jump, and the jovial colonel of the Dragoons ordered the minions to make thing ready.

Confidence then cleared the top rail by several inches, and the cheers that greeted the feat were the loudest that have been emitted during this show.

"It did it for a bit of a joke, but it had the result of showing what's in a horse, and this is a horse show," said Col. Lessard, apologetically, when The World asked him about it.

Hon. Mr. Beck's Win.
The feature of the afternoon show was the win made by Miss Viva Kerr in the ladies' saddle class. At night, the prize winner, Hon. Adam Beck and his wife. They took first and second in the tandem, and almost ungalantly letting his better half get the second prize. At the front of the hon. gentleman's tandem was a hollow-headed horse that had great action and was a good leader, but there was a little bit of talk about him being shaped wrong for the prize class.

Along the line as to the judging, and some post-mortems will be held. General grunts are the order of the day. Inefficiency of the judges are openly charged, and one man says that even the horses kick.

MYOPIA JUMPED 6 FT. 10 IN.

Marvellous Performance in Ring Thursday Night—All the Awards.

The second day of the Canadian Horse Show saw very few scratches in any of the classes. In the morning the sweepstakes, for best hackney stallion, went to Rosary, belonging to H. J. Spencely of Box Grove. Mrs. A. Beck won first in pairs of horses shown in afternoon. Mrs. Beck was first and second in class 22, and the evening she won first and second in the harness tandem, Mrs. Beck driving the winners, which by the way, were never hitched together before till last night. At that time they were both over in a Toronto show-ring. Their action and conformation were good, particularly the wheeler, whose grand action brought applause after applause from the stand.

In the Toronto Hunt Plate, Cloth of Gold, ridden by Alf. Rogers, won first prize, and in this event G. W. Beardmore, M.F.H., had a hard horse to handle, and was forced, with his will, to bite the dust. In the high jump, Myopia, owned by Miss Pepper, Toronto, won, jumping 6 ft. 10 inches. The New York horse, Pearl, was the one most fancied for this, but she was forced to take second.

A protest was lodged yesterday afternoon in regard to the King Edward trophy, but it was on account of the trophy not being 15 hands high. It is claimed there was no specification of how high the horse should stand, and that 15 hands in this year's book was only a printer's error. The committee will meet this morning to decide the case.

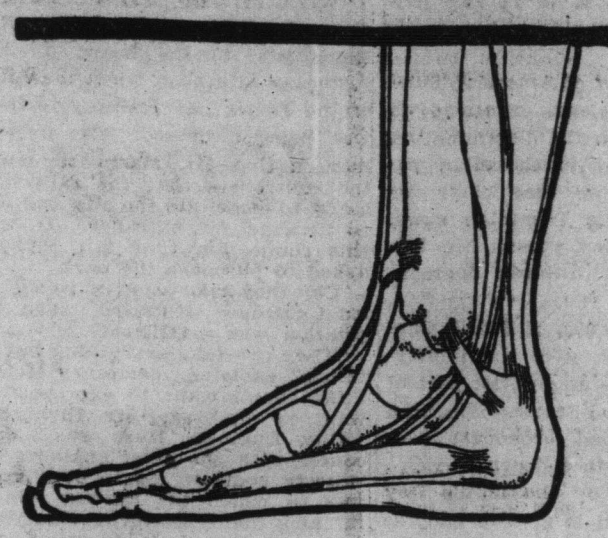

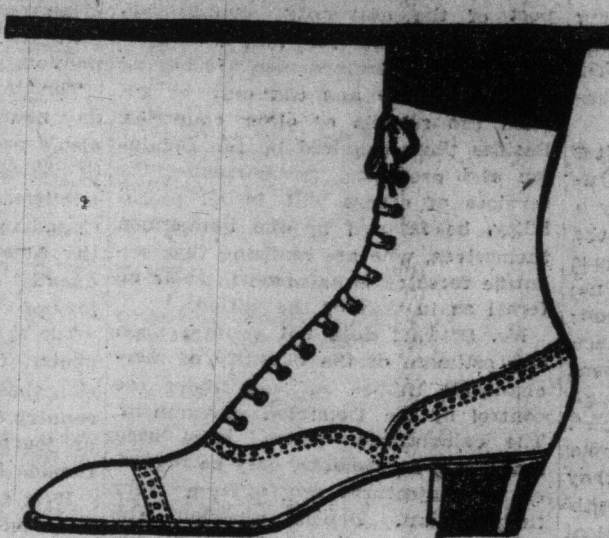
