No Evidence Submitted by Defendant—Woman Gets Custody of Son.

Reno, Nev., July 30.—Mrs. Wm. Ellis Corey, wife of the president of the United States Steel Corporation, was awarded a divorce in the second district court of Nevada to-day.

TRIANGULAR TRUCE BRIEF.

Tartar Population Striving to Overwhelm Allies.

St. Petersburg, July 31.—The triangular truce between Armenians, Tartars and the Russian troops before Shusha was of the briefest nature. The display of white flags and the naming of representatives of warring factions to arrange a lasting peace was but a prelude to the resumption of hostilities yesterday upon a larger and bloodier scale.

WHY ENGLAND HALTS.

Rival Sea Powers Are Cutting Naval Estimates.

London, July 30.—In the house of lords to-night, Baron Tweedmouth, first lord of the admiralty, defending the government's reduction of the naval program, instanced especially France, the United States, Germany and Russia as greatly delaying or partially abandoning the construction of proposed warships.

HARD TALE OF IMMIGRANTS.

Writers in English Papers Say Pay Is Not Sufficient.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable). London, July 30.—A clergyman and others have written to The Daily Mail in regard to the cheap rates to Canada for harvesters. They say the wages at best only pay expenses, and that the worker leaves the immigrant life of Ontario and Winnipeg anxious to get home.

WILL COVER DEFICIENCY.

Heniker Heaton Guarantees Against Loss From Penny Postage.

London, July 30.—John Heniker Heaton, Conservative member of parliament for Canterbury, and father of the "imperial penny postage" idea, has addressed a letter to Chancellor of the Exchequer, Asquith, and Postmaster General Buxton, offering to provide an acceptable bank guarantee to cover the loss in revenue for the first three years, which might be required for the adoption of penny postage between Great Britain and America.

SINKS AT HOWE SOUND.

Steamer Superior Strikes Rock—Crew Get Away in Lifeboats.

Victoria, B. C., July 30.—(Special.)—The steamer Superior, owned by Capt. G. H. French, struck an uncharted rock last night in Howe Sound, near Cambier Island and sank. The crew took to the boats and got away in lifeboats. The wreck lies in 40 feet of water and may be raised.

OSCAR TAKES ACTION.

Proceedings Against Members of Manifesto League.

St. Petersburg, July 30.—The public prosecutor has started proceedings against the members of the lower house of parliament who signed the Viborg manifesto. The charge under which the signers of the manifesto will be brought to trial is violation of article 129 of the criminal code, which provides for attempts to overthrow the existing government.

BOMB THROWER ARRESTED.

Odessa, July 30.—The police to-day arrested 50 employees of the customs who were on strike.

FOUNDERS IN GULF.

Peasagola, Fla., July 30.—It was rumored to-day that the Australia steamer Captain Bartolich, which cleared from this port July 24 for Marseilles, Spezia and Venice, had foundered somewhere in the Gulf of Mexico.

DEAD ON TRAIN.

Ottawa, July 30.—George Lemieux, a young man whose home is supposed to be in Montreal, was found dead on a Grand Trunk train as it drew into Dupont Harbor on Saturday.

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NEW POSTOFFICE PLANS FROM HEAD OF STEEL TRUST

Mr. Walsh Steps Out—City Hall Matters.

A conference was held yesterday between Hon. C. S. Hyman, minister of public works, and Mayor Coatsworth, regarding the leasing of the site of the new postoffice building at the corner of Front and Bay-streets. Mr. Hyman believed that the site would be required by the government if the railways carried out their present plans for the location of a union station, but he said that until there was a definite understanding on this point, the government could not positively announce the limits of a post-office site.

LONDON TO SELL OWN MILK TO CHECK INFANT DEATHS

Profits of Street Railways for Present Year Will Amount to \$255,000.

London, July 30.—London's milk supply will soon be in the hands of the county council. Already the Battersea Borough Council, which governs a poor and densely populated district of London, has established depots for the supply of sterilized milk for babies.
