CANNOT UNDERSTAND SLUMP IN THE MARKET

Trethewey Has Just Shipped Three Cars of Ore—Notes on Other Mines.

Cobalt, Ont., March 8, 1907.—(From the Man on the Spot.)—Enquiries have frequently been made of the "Man on the Spot" as to what was doing at the "Silver Bar." This is a property that was highly thought of last spring and when the stock was put on the market at fifty cents per share the issue was largely over-subscribed. It is one of the few of the early propositions that was jumped at by the camp, which has not yet made good. Despite its apparent failure, the men in the camp who hold this stock have faith that it will ultimately win out. This confidence is largely inspired by the fact that the integrity of the men at the head and in control of the venture is unquestioned.

Location is O. K.
The location of the "Silver Bar" is O. K. Considerable development work has been done, but it is not yet a mine. The main shaft is now down nearly 100 feet, and at this depth the vein has widened and in places shows up well in nicotite and smaltite. On the surface the vein was a mere stringer. The intention is to drift and cross-cut at the 100 ft. level, and judging by the experiences of the properties, the chances are good that valuable blind veins will be discovered.

Temiskaming the Mecca.
Down in the Cross Lake extension of the camp work goes on steadily at all the leading properties. The Temiskaming is of course the Mecca in this part of Coleman. Forty men are at present employed here, but with the completion of the new bunk house, that force will be doubled. First-class buildings have been erected, comfortable of a bunk house, two stores high, 20x40, a dining hall, 20 ft. square, an office building, shaft and ore houses, and blacksmith shop. It is satisfactory to report that the wonderful ore body which has struck in the main shaft at the 75 ft. level has been proved in the drift, which has

been run both ways at this level for a distance of 30 ft. The vein at this depth runs in width from 8 to 14 inches, and the large nugget which was seen at the exhibition at the King Edward is a fair sample of the ore in the drifts.

Mass of Solid Silver.
Managing Director Shillingford predicts that this ore will carry from 15,000 to 20,000 oz. of silver per ton. In appearance it very much resembles the ore that is at present coming up the shaft at the Silver Queen, and is composed of calcite and silver, being almost a mass of solid silver. A carload of medium grade ore has already been sacked at this property, and there are two carloads on the dump, which will run from 200 to 700 oz. silver per ton.

Will Await Spur Line.
None of the miners in this part of the camp will attempt to ship their low grade ore until the Kerr Lake extension of the T. & N. is completed. The contracts for this extension have been let, and the work will probably be completed by next August. The Temiskaming will ship one carload of their high-grade ore before the snowfalls, and those who know expect it will be a record making. The first-class plant, consisting of one 100 horse-power boiler, one 6 ft. steam compressor, one 8 1/4 x 10 ft. steam hoist, drills, pumps, etc., and a direct connected electric light plant, has been ordered, part of which has already been delivered and will be installed within the next three weeks.

Dividend Cheques in Camp.
At the McCormack Superintendent of the camp is devoting his energies to the development of the north 40 acres. This is being done by diamond drill, and he reports that they are sinking on a 2-inch calcite vein, which is heavily stained with caliche-pyrite. Right of Way Mining Company's cheques are floating around the camp, the result of the first dividend declared by this company. Two and three per cent. dividends are fashionable in Cobalt. The Right of Way with its seven per cent. is the leader.

Blind Vein in Mecca.
At the McKinley-Darragh the new boilers have been set up, and the ginpoles are in place to erect the smokestack. Their 10 ft. drill compressor has been shipped, and until its arrival, while the present compressor is running right up to its fullest capacity, hand drills are kept at work working at the 75 foot level in shaft No. 1, the stonking revealed that the vein on the slope was widening, and showed a foot of solid metal. It was cross-cutting at the 75 ft. level, and from this shaft, and at a distance of

153 feet, that the blind vein was discovered, which looks very rich in silver, and when found, was over 5 inches wide. After the shooting last night, this vein showed increased width and is considered an excellent find to be made at that level. Two 20-ton cars of ore are sacked and ready to ship, one of high grade and the other of second grade ore.

Why the Slump?
Three carloads of ore were sent out this week by the Trethewey, and the camp is at a loss to understand why the stock of this company has received so many bumps lately.

Overcrowding Enquiry.
The enquiry into the overcrowding of the street cars was continued yesterday, and was adjourned till Tuesday next. The witnesses examined yesterday were Superintendent Nix, Conductors R. Brown, Chas. Newberry, Mr. McQuade, J. W. Dickson and H. Mayrick, while Wm. Fairbairn, who did some counting, also gave evidence. The burden of their testimony was that passengers insisted on crowding into the first car that came along, while the car behind would be almost deserted.

C. N. R. Application.
The assurance of Aid. Wilson and Aid. Chisholm that little opposition could be found to the C.N.R.'s plans for using land in the Don Valley for a railway yard, aided by the favorable resolution of the Riverdale Business Men's Association, decided the board of control yesterday to approve the draft agreement prepared by the city solicitor.

Engaging an Expert.
The engaging of Mr. Tye, formerly chief engineer of the C.P.R., to assist the city engineer, and C. B. Smith in preparing a report on the whole Esplanade and waterfront problem, including the viaduct, was approved, on Mr. Rust's recommendation, the Controller Hubbard held that it would be a waste of money. Barclay Parsons, consulting engineer of New York, stated that his fee for the work would be \$5,000 and \$10,000, and the board was unfavorable to such expenditure. Mr. Tye's terms are not yet known, but it is thought they will be more reasonable.

Yonge St. Bridge Fight.
Letters were received from Solicitors A. A. Creighton and the C.P.R., announcing that the city's application for new legislation regarding Yonge-street bridge would be opposed by both railways.

Flying Rollers on Warpath.
Windsor, March 8.—D. L. McKay, secretary to Mrs. Mason, head of the Flying Rollers, announced that he will hold a series of meetings to make converts.

CROWD THE CAR THAT COMES CAR BEHIND RUNS EMPTY

So Say Company's Witnesses—Privy Council Reserves Judgment.

CITY HALL TO-DAY.

4.15 p.m.—Reception to General Booth in council chamber.

"Appeals heard; judgment reserved."

This was the laconic cablegram received by Corporation Counsel Fullerton yesterday from London, Eng., and signified that the privy council had concluded its hearing of the street railway's appeals against the omnibus suit, and the other suits involving the right of the city engineer to direct the routes to be used, and the right of the city to exact mileage from the company on lines extended thru territory not included within Toronto's limits at the time the agreement was drawn up.

Mr. Fullerton expects that judgment will probably be rendered within two months. Should the privy council uphold the decision of the supreme court as to the routes, the city will then be in a position to demand the instant restoration of the old routes in the Winchester, Bathurst and Arthur cars.
