project. Mr. Keating ought to be .20 aware of the fact that we have no "local companies" in Toronto. There is only one company, and that company .10 enjoys a monopoly of the whole business. In the next place the charges are not low. Current for power is charged all the way from 4 to 12 cents per horsepower per hour, which is equivalent to .69 paying 300 or 400 per cent. more than cost price.

.50 POISONOUS COAL GAS AGAIN.

The suffocation of the three railway .50 employes in the St. Clair tunnel is another reminder of the fact that the gas emanating from hard coal is a deadly pcison. Provision should be made in connection with every stove for the escape of the gas to the open air. Every · 3.75 winter scores of people are suffocated by the fumes of closely-damped coal stoves, while the injury done to the general hearth of the people from the same cause is incalculable. The trouble at St. Clair tunnel can easily be obviated by providing adequate ventilation or by substituting electric motors for the steam locomotives now in use. The steam locomotives now in use.
