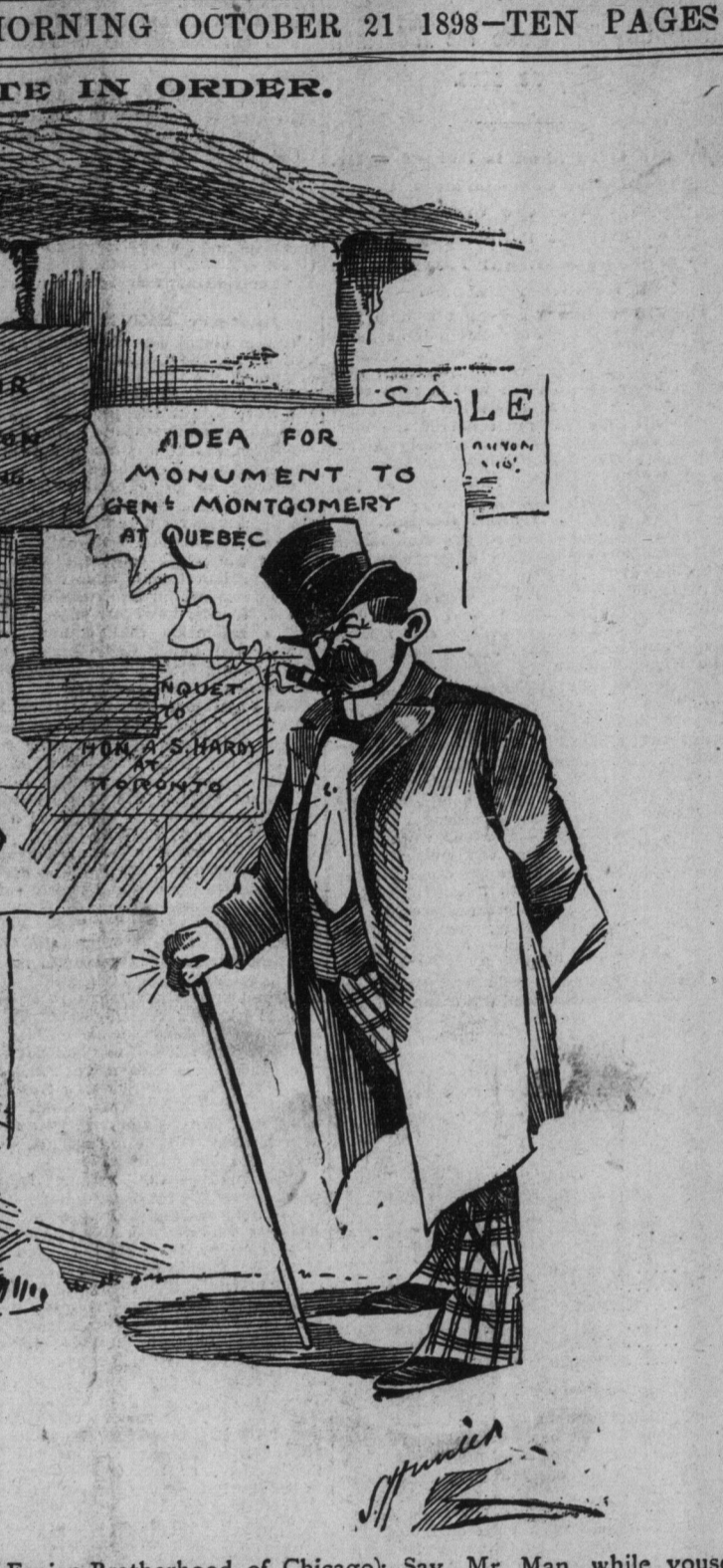

BEHIND AMERICAN CITIES. British Metropolis Cannot Equal Us in Fire Appliances. London, Oct. 20.—New fire engines, constructed on the American plan, are being experimented with here, and horses are being attached to ladder wagons. The change is in part due to recent newspaper criticism of the antiquated London methods of reaching fires. Chemical engines, water towers and hook and ladders are still unknown in London. The Daily Mail commenting on the matter said: "Many of the second-rate American cities have more efficient appliances for fire fighting than the British metropolis."

THE SOUTH ONTARIO FIGHT. Rally at Oshawa Last Night in the Interest of Mr. Charles Calder. The Candidate Was Enthusiastically Cheered—Mr. Carscallen of Hamilton Arraigned the Government, as Did Also Mr. Hoyle of North Ontario—The Contest is Growing Warm. Oshawa, Ont., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—The fight in South Ontario between Hon. John Dryden, the unseated of the people, and Charles Calder, the unseated of the courts, is raging fierce, far and wide. To-night the Conservatives held a grand rally here in the Music Hall, as a counter-blow for the big Dryden gathering of two nights ago. The feeling here is at the highest tension and the climax must have been reached to-night, when 1000 people surged into the hall. They were in a friendly mood. They applauded Mr. Calder when they entered, they clapped every sentence he spoke, and they hurrahed him with the Queen.

PEGLEG BROWN. Was Arraigned at London Yesterday for Murdering Constable Tooby. London, Oct. 20.—Madie Brown, the alleged slayer of Constable Tooby, was arraigned this morning before Police Magistrate Park. The evidence is much the same as that already given in the accounts of the tragedy. Only witnesses and others having some connection with the proceedings are admitted to the court room. Nothing important was elicited in the preliminary trial of Pegleg Brown in the afternoon, and the court adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow morning. THE VOTE IN ONTARIO. Mr. F. S. H. Payne of Seattle, L.A.W. track rider, said several steamers were on sand bars in the river and ice was forming round them when he left. PROMISES TO SPEND MONEY RIGHT LOYALLY. Mr. Tarte, at Sorel, Claimed That There Would be a Surplus of Two Millions This Year and Any Government That Could Gather in Shokels Like That Should Spend Them—Sir Louis Davies Complimented Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Tarte. Montreal, Oct. 20.—(Special.)—The demonstration held at Sorel to-day in honor of Hon. Mr. Tarte was not the success that the Minister expected, although Sir Louis Davies and Hon. Dr. Borden were present. Out of a dozen French Liberal members, only one, Mr. Dupre, M. P., was present from Montreal, and this appeared to nettle the Minister of Public Works, as he was quite defiant when he spoke of those who were crying out that the Government did not want Conservative support. These men said Mr. Tarte could not certainly want to remain in power. He said he had gone into the Cabinet to represent the many thousand Conservatives who had supported Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the last general election. He had not been asked to deny his past and did not intend to. In fact, had he been asked to do so, he might not have accepted office. Mr. Tarte claimed that the surplus for the current year would be over \$2,000,000, and added that any government making money this way should spend it in a liberal and legitimate manner. For his part he intended to spend money right loyally, as this was what the people wanted. Sir Louis Davies made a funny speech. He said that he was deeply touched when Mr. Tarte had pointed out to him the spot where, forty years ago, he and his mother used to sell fruit on the market place of Sorel, and Sir Louis said that as Mr. Tarte was now one of the greatest statesmen of Canada, this only showed what could be done by a man of ability and integrity. Sir Louis challenged any Tory to meet him in public and he would show that every promise made before the election had been fulfilled. He also claimed that the Conservatives by their rejection of the Yukon bill had driven \$20,000,000 worth of trade from Canadian to American channels. Regarding the Quebec conference, the Minister of Marine said his lips were sealed, yet he could say that the Americans had met them in a friendly spirit that there was a strong probability that most of the vexed questions would be settled to the satisfaction of both countries. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier could make a favorable treaty, Sir Louis said that this would be the crowning point in the career of the greatest statesman Canada had ever produced. Hon. Dr. Borden did not say anything of great interest. He went on. Coming towards the conclusion he reverted to local issues. He asked the electors to register on March 1 their protest against this nonsense, and give Charles over 300 majority (Applause). There was some denouncing, when he added, "I think Mr. Calder won on March 1 as honestly and honorably as John Dryden ever did. I see there are a few Grits present." He responded to the murmuring at the back of the hall, and then he repeated the words, which caused dissent. Mr. Calder was unseated perhaps by the indiscretion of his agents, perhaps by a conspiracy, he persisted, and himself followed this time, Mr. Dryden, he concluded amid cheers, would have had the seat if his own skirts had been clean, but he didn't claim it because he knew that Charles Calder had outwitted him, and that he was as deep in the mud as Mr. Calder was in the mire. Mr. Hoyle's Address. W. H. Hoyle, M.L.A., spoke last, dwelling on the career of Charles Calder, the municipal career. He ridiculed the pan-stricken Government, which had been asked to a legitimate channel by the public press. A simple letter had made them withdraw a writ calling the South Ontario election to Oct. 27, and changing it to Nov. 1. (Applause). Mr. Dryden, who Mr. Hoyle was trying to canonize, he would prefer to canonize. Mr. Calder, on the other hand, in his one and only session, had made a favorable impression in the House, both as a practical farmer and business man. Touching upon the recalcitrant Grits, who had thrown the Minister, he predicted that the latter would prefer the trade winds, which were constant in their blowing in one direction in the town of Oshawa. A large crowd was present at the meeting. The Liberals nominated Hon. J. M. Gibson, while the Conservative nominated Dr. Coughlin.
