EVERYBODY IS VISITING IT.

The Bewildering Exhibition and the Music on Yonge-Street Attracted Attention.

THE NEW "SLATER SHOE STORE."

Mr. Henry Martin Tells The World How This Business is Booming as It Is To-Day.

Music and brightness marked the opening of the new "Slater Shoe Store," at 1233 Yonge-street, last night. The bewildering exhibition and the music attracted much attention and has caused a great deal of comment. But, as one spectator was heard to remark: "Who ever heard of the 'Slater Shoe' people doing anything by halves?"

A reporter met Mr. Henry Martin, the advertising manager of the firm that makes the famous shoe, he having come up from Montreal to assist at the opening. From him it was learned that the "Slater Shoe," branded with the name and price, had only been on the market about three years. Before that the makers were making all kinds of shoes, just as other manufacturers are doing to-day. When the "Slater Shoe" was brought out all other kinds were dropped, and only the men's fine shoes, now so familiar, were made.

How It Was Done.

"It would be interesting to know," said the reporter, "how you have succeeded in establishing such a big trade in such a short time."

"First, because we specialized our product, making only Goodyear welted 'Slater Shoes' for men, and made them as good as they ought to be, for the trade we're after. Then we told the consumer in plain language in bright, intelligent advertising in the newspapers, using space in them liberally."

We built a demand with the wearer, and there was anxiety on the part of the dealer to get them to sell, even though the profit on the sale is not so large as on some other Canadian or American goods.

As Everybody Knows.

"The Slater Shoe" is stamped on the soles with the makers' name and price, with their date frame trademark, thus protecting the wearer, who need not take any one's word for its value.

Naturally, the consumer liked the shoe, otherwise he would have stopped wearing them, and our trade would have died out in a few months."

Which means "The Slater" must be better than most other shoes on the market," suggested the reporter.

Not only that, but the price stamped on the sole is a guarantee from the makers that the price is no more than it ought to be."

The Cost Lessened.

"How do you make 'The Slater Shoe' better than other shoes?"

\$175,000.00 of this amount was subscribed within a week after the charter was applied for. This is pretty good evidence that it is "a good thing" from an investment point of view. Mr. J. J. Woodgate, vice-president, and Mr. R. M. Smith, one of the directors of the new company, were also in the city to attend the opening.

The New Store. A word must be said about the new store, which was visited by thousands yesterday. It is to be appreciated it must be seen, as it is without doubt the most complete shoe store in the city. It has been sheathed with an eye to capacity, and its stock comprises the latest in shoe-making. The mirror and electric light combination on the south side is disposed in the most pleasing manner, while the rest of the fittings are in keeping with the store itself.

This makes the fifth "Slater Shoe Store" in Canada. Two are in this city, two in Montreal, and one in just commencing.

KILLED WHILE DRUNK.

Two British Columbia Men Lay Down on the Track to Sleep and the Train Did It.

Cranbrook, B.C., Herald: Two men named James Stewart and Michael J. Richmond, employed as laborers on the road at Moyelle, met with a sudden and painful death at 1:30 Sunday morning. The men had been drinking heavily all evening at Moyelle, and about 12 o'clock started for their boarding car, which is located at Moyelle. They reached the track, and walked only a short distance, when they lay down in a drunken stupor in the centre of the track, where their heads resting on the rails, where they were struck by the east-bound train that passed at 12:30. The bodies were found about half an hour after the train had passed, and were found in a state of decomposition. The train was stopped, and the bodies were removed to the hospital. The cause of the accident was the men's drunkenness.
