BANNERMAN ASKS BALFOUR

About That "Apparently" Official

Communication in The London

Times.

"WAR OFFICE MUST BE PREPARED

For Any Contingency, Was What

the Government Leader Inti-

ated in Reply.

London, July 7.—In the House of Com-

mons to-day Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman,

Liberal leader in the House, asked

the Government leader, Mr. A. J. Balfour,

if he had any statement to make on the

apparently official communication pub-

lished in The Times this morning giving

the names of a number of officers said

to have been ordered to proceed to South

Africa for the purpose of organizing the

residents, as well as the police and local

forces, at various points on the frontier.

Mr. Balfour replied that he was not

in a position to give an official communi-

cation, which appears as an official commu-

nication in The Times.

What He Wanted to Know.

The leader of the Opposition, Sir Henry

Campbell-Bannerman, rejoined: "It is not

with regard to bringing the present force

to a proper standard of efficiency that I

wish to enquire, but as to the paragraph,

Mr. Balfour replied: "I do not think

there is any new declaration of policy in

that paragraph, but I consider that the

War Office would be extraordinarily well

equipped in its most ordinary and obvious

duties if it had not prepared for any emer-

gency, however undesirable, and however un-

likely, that could possibly arise."

ficers spoken of in the communication re-

ferred to South Africa were going into Cape

Colonial forces, and, if so, whether they

were with the consent of the colonial author-

ities."

Mr. Balfour: "I do not know."

servative member for the Holderness Divi-

sion of Yorkshire): "Would the right hon.

gentleman say in what circumstances the
