LARGEST VESSEL EVER BUILT

White Star Liner Oceanic Has Arrived
at New York on Her First Voyage.

OVER 2000 PEOPLE ON BOARD.

Registers 17,000 Tons, Engines 45,000 Horse-Power, Consumes 500 Tons of Coal Daily.

New York, Sept. 13.—The great steamer Oceanic of the White Star Line was sighted east of Fire Island at 8 o'clock this morning. She left Queenstown at 12:45 p.m. last Thursday, and estimating she will reach the lights at 10 o'clock, the time of her passage will be about 6 days 2 hours. It is probable that owing to her great draught she will not attempt to cross the bar at high water, which is at half-past 1 this afternoon, at Sandy Hook, so her appearance in the upper bay can hardly be expected before 3 o'clock.

Good Time Made.

The time made by the Oceanic may be considered very good, as heavy gales have been reported on the Atlantic during her passage, and compares favorably with that of the swiftest of the Great Eastern line, such as the Campania, which made the passage in 6 days 16 hours and 31 minutes. Next following are the Campania, Umbria, Majestic and Etruria.

Largest Vessel Ever Built.

The Oceanic is the largest vessel ever built. Her dimensions are 704 feet long, 72 feet beam and 68 feet depth, with draught of 22 feet and loaded 22,500 tons. She registers 17,000 tons, her engines were designed to develop 45,000 horse-power. Her coal capacity is about 6000 tons. She consumes about 500 tons of coal daily.

The ship has two funnels, each of 20 feet diameter, and 80 feet above the gun. Her passenger accommodation is for 625 cabin and 1000 steerage, and she carries a crew of 450 men. It was called when she sailed from Queenstown on the present trip that she had on board 2000 souls. So much larger is she than the other White Star steamers that the line built a new dock on the North River to accommodate her. The Oceanic displacement is 30,000 tons.

Compared With Great Eastern.

Compared with the Great Eastern, the greatest ship ever built before her, she is 24,000 tons greater. The Great Eastern, which was built on the Thames in 1850, measured 800 feet long, 80 feet beam and had a draught of 30 feet. She registered 10,000 tons, and her engines developed 7600 horse-power.

The North German Lloyd ship, Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, the next largest in size, built two years ago, is 648 feet long, 66 feet beam and 26 feet draught. She registers 14,000 tons, and has 30,000 horse-power.

No Attempt at Records.

No day's run exceeded 200 knots. The steamer is said to have made no attempt at records, or even great speed. The voyage was pleasant and uneventful. The engines were run throughout without a hitch, neither stopping or slowing in the way, and her builder, the Rt. Hon. W. J. Pirie, who was on board, said that the steamer had come up to his expectations in every particular.

KILLED FATHER AND MOTHER.

Brilliant Crime of Peter King, Who Was Crayed by Over-Indulgence in Liquor.

South Bridge, Mass., Sept. 13.—John King and his wife, an aged couple living near the village of Plimouth, about ten miles northwest of this place, were killed last night by their son, Peter, who was crazed with the excessive use of liquor. The skulls of both were crushed by a heavy instrument, and death was almost instantaneous.

The murderer also attempted to kill his brother, Thomas, but only succeeded in inflicting severe wounds. Peter is now confined in the lock-up here. He is in an unconscious condition and may die.

In the Surrogate Court.

Surrogate Court proceedings took place yesterday in the estate of the late George Ender, bricklayer, who died, leaving \$18,000 made up of cash and real estate. He left four houses on Business-street, worth \$2200, to his wife, and \$8000 in cash to his children, of whom there were three.

Mrs. E. R. Benick applied for letters of administration in the estate of her late husband, who left a \$2000 life insurance policy.

Application was also made by A. P. Allen for probate of the will of his wife, who bequeathed \$1200 in real estate to her husband and children.
