

His Worship read a lengthy history of the city's litigation with the Gas Company, and he recommended that an offer be made to purchase

the Gas stock at 214 per share, which was the present market price. He believed that the owners should not be compelled to sell their stock at less than it cost them, and by allowing \$10,000 for those shareholders who had got their present holdings at a higher price than 214, it would entail a total expenditure of \$3,755,170 to acquire the company. He thought the company would, however, refuse that offer. Then the city would be in a position to ask for legislation to amend the act. The city would have to make the offer before tubmitting the bylaw to the people. If the city bought the plant at the
