A Six-Club League

Including London, St. Thomas, Stratford, Guelph, Chatham and Hamilton.

Cal. Davis Elected President and Secretary-Treasurer.

Montreal Loses Yesterday's Game at Lancaster, Pa.—National League Scores—Turf and Other Sporting Events.

BASEBALL

All rumors and prophecies that there would be "a new king in Israel" flattered off into the smoke-blue air last night and Cal. Davis was re-elected president and secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Baseball League. It took just 30 seconds. Guelph, Stratford, London and St. Thomas had talked of changes—complete and sweeping changes—but when the meeting came to the election of officers, Mr. Stroud of Hamilton, nominated Cal. Davis for "president, secretary-treasurer and the whole thing," as he very expressively put it, Mr. Thompson, of St. Thomas, seconded. Stratford looked at London, and London looked at Guelph, but nobody spoke. No other names being offered, Cal. Davis was declared elected and made a modest little speech, thanking them for the honor and taking advantage of the occasion to deny certain malicious insinuations that he was financially or in any way interested in the Hamilton baseball club.

It was 8:50 when the magnates finally got together at the Tecumseh House last night. Chatham was represented by W. E. Hadley and T. M. Tennent. St. Thomas by J. Thompson and F. E. Johnson. Stratford by J. Kress and F. J. Corrie. Hamilton by Wm. Stroud and "Chub" Collins. Guelph by George Black and London by Bert Sheere and Pete Lohman. President Cal. Davis was in the chair. The Guelph and Stratford delegates withdrew during a preliminary session of the original four-club league, at which, on motion of Mr. Tennent, seconded by Mr. Stroud, a resolution was passed admitting Stratford and Guelph on condition that if either of them, for any cause, should drop out, and it should be necessary to reorganize a four-club league, then the other of the two clubs would drop out, but if one of the original four should drop out, the Guelph by reason of seniority, should have preference in the reorganization of a four-club league.

All very satisfactory for the original four, when back comes Guelph and Stratford, and raises strenuous objection. War between Chatham and Guelph, which ends in George Black securing a reconsideration of the resolution on motion of Mr. Thompson. Mr. Stroud moving, and Mr. Johnson seconding, a new resolution, which provides that if any club with draw from the six-club league, and it should be found necessary to reorganize a four-club league, the total membership of the league shall determine which clubs shall remain, and there shall be no appeal from such decision. This was finally adopted, Chatham voting against and kicking vigorously. Chatham fears that if Stratford should fall by the wayside, then Chatham, and not Guelph, might be considered the undesirable "gooseberry," and lopped off to make the four-club league. But, of course, nobody expects Stratford or any of the six to fall down, so the point may never be raised.

Guelph and Stratford were satisfied and were duly admitted to membership.

A board of directors was elected as follows: Stratford, F. J. Corrie; Guelph, George Black; London, Bert Sheere; St. Thomas, F. Johnson; Chatham, F. T. Quinn; Hamilton, Wm. Stroud.

A few unimportant changes in the constitution were made, one of which is intended to prevent the farming of players from major leagues. To the forfeiture clause was added a proviso to cover unavoidable delays, particularly in the matter of railway connections.

It was past midnight before the directors got to work on the schedule, and as it was found impossible to complete it satisfactorily inside of several

days, President Davis was instructed to prepare a schedule and submit it to the board at the earliest moment possible.

The club uniforms for 1929 will be as follows: Guelph, maroon, with green trimmings; Stratford, green, with maroon trimmings; Chatham, red and blue; Hamilton, black and white; London and St. Thomas will toss up the black and gray, and the loser discover a new combination.

The introduction of such new elements as the Duke of Middleburg and Duke of Topmast will add greatly to the interest of the Woodbine meeting, where they will meet the champions of the Hendrie, Seagram and Dawes stables on home ground. The horses trained away from home will have a decided advantage in the matter of condition, having already been to the races.

FISTIC. GARDNER WON. Wheeling, W. Va., April 19.—Before the biggest crowd ever seen in the Metropolitan Club Oscar Gardner, of this city, routed Mr. Caruthers, dyer King of Buffalo, in the 15th round of what was to have been a 20-round fight. HOW TARIFFS WORK

Had to Pay \$10 Duty on a \$12 Horse.

Detroit News: The race horse Appleby, which was valued at \$1,000, was sent over to Windsor to take part in the races there, and while on the Canadian border was completely overhauled and was sold for \$10 to A. Laforte, of Sandwich East. The Windsor Driving Park Association had given a bond to the customs authorities, guaranteeing the horse would be returned to the United States, and their bond could be released they had to return the animal to the land of the free. They sent to Laforte and notified him that the horse must be sent over the river to relieve them from their bond, but he replied that he had sold it to John Kerr, of Maldstone. Kerr refused to send the horse into town unless he was guaranteed his expenses. This the association had to agree to, and the horse was sent over to Detroit and the bond released, but when the animal was brought back to Canada the customs officers valued it at \$40 and demanded \$12 duty. Kerr refused to pay, and insisted on getting the horse back, and the end of it was that the association had to pay for duty exactly \$2 more than the horse fetched when it was sold at auction. It would have paid the association better to have bought the horse and shot it after releasing their bond.

BRITISH IN INDIA

An Interesting Letter From Mr. Goldwin Smith.

American Expansionists Fail to Appreciate the Differences in the Form of Government.

New York, April 18.—The following letter from Mr. Goldwin Smith appears in the New York Sun:

Those who hold up British administration in India as a model to be followed in American government of dependencies pay England a compliment which an Englishman welcomes with pleasure; but they seem to me not distinctly to understand what the British system of government in India is. They fail to observe that Great Britain has two crowns, one royal and constitutional, the other imperial. The Indian Empire is under the imperial crown. Its government, which is autocratic, is kept separate from the constitutional government of Great Britain, and upon that separation depends, on one hand, the exemption of India from the influence of British party politics, and, on the other hand, the immunity of British politics from the contagion of an autocratic empire. Fear of a reciprocal influence which might be injurious alike to Great Britain and to India and some Liberals oppose the abolition of the East India Company, and the transfer of India to the crown. But the distinction between the kingdom and the empire has been jealously guarded, and the Queen is positively precluded from ever assuming the title of Empress in Great Britain.

You apparently have nothing at present corresponding to the separate crowns, nor any special apparatus for the government of dependencies or safeguard against a reciprocal influence which may be injurious alike to the dependencies and the imperial crown. You only non-political organ or government is West Point. So long as the dependencies are in the hands of the West Pointers there is every reason to believe that the administration will be upright and in its way efficient. But this is military rule; not a step toward the introduction of self-government, but rather a step in the other direction.

Self-government, however, can hardly be introduced by a conqueror. It must apparently come, as all other elements of national greatness come, by development from the native stock. British rule in India, with all its ability and benevolence, is not paying the way for self-government. The political future of the Hindu is a blank.
