### **MENNONITES TO GIVE MILLION TO CANADA** WITHOUT INTEREST

**How Conscientious Objectors** of Manitoba Are Helping

Stockholm, Nov. 25.—At least one of the alleged diplomatic documents now being published by Leon Trotzky, the Bolsheviki foreign minister, is a fabrication, according to M. Goulkevitch, the Russian minister here. The document in question purported to be a telegram sent by Goulkevitch to Petrograd declaring that he had been in-formed from Madrid of the proposed seizure of Swedish diplomatic pouches and protesting against it on the ground that it might alienate the new Swedish Government. M. Goulkevitch authorizes the statement that this dispatch as published in the Petrograd newspaper Pravda by the Bolsheviki, is a deliberate fabrication. He adds:

"I never sent such a telegram to anybody. Any non-partisan reader can understand how absurd it is in view of the fact that I could not possibly have received such information from Madrid "

RADICAL "REFORMS." London, Nov. 29 .- The Daily Mail's Petrograd correspondent, in a dispatch gives an outline of the projected law respecting housing, as printed in the Prayda. According to this outline every person paying rent below 1,200 rubles yearly is to be exempted from any payments of rent for the next six months. Lodgers renting rooms also are to be exempt and evictions will not be permitted without a decision by the revolutionary court.

Each member of a family is entitled to one room. Surplus rooms are to be placed at the disposal of workers now living in unsanitary lodgings. are to be prepared of such lodgings, and from them the dwellers are to be removed to houses of wealthy persons. All hotels and furnished lodgings are to be immediately taken by the workmen's councils and placed under the management of the hotel employees' union.
