Wood, another big exhibitor, has 75 varieties. This display includes some very fine early iris, early single peonies, and other novelties of spring bloom.

This is the place where iris is being shown by a collection of dwarf lilacs, such as the local parks, is also on display.

Truly the whole exhibit is a sight worth seeing. This is the place where one should come to learn how many different varieties of the flowers there are, and to see the women making the round of the tables this morning. The exhibitors are: W. E. Only One Year Ago But How Different!

London Nurses Were Then
Being Bombed by
Huns.

Miss Bertha Smith, child welfare nurse, and Mrs. J. B. Groshever, who resumes in the near future her duties as superintendent of the Victoria Home for incurables, have excellent reason to ponder upon the contrast between this week in their lives and the corresponding week, according to the calendar, a year ago.

Just a year ago now, both were nursing sisters with hospitals at Etaples, France. Nursing Sister Bertha Smith with a British St. John Ambulance Hospital, to which she had been attached from the time it was established there, and Nursing Sister J. B. Groshever, with No. 7 Canadian Stationary Hospital quite near by.

During the whole of the last week of May and some preceding days, the hospital area was continually under the order of bombing, the nurses snatching sleep or trying to do so in their hours off, out in the beds in the open. On the 30th of May, the St. John Ambulance Hospital was demolished, the brave young nurse on duty with Miss Smith killed at her side, and the ward almost totally lost. The only escape was due to the protection of sand bags piled around the ward.

The high window by which she stood in the west side of the Dominion Savings Building commanded a broad and peaceful view of sunlit, smiling landscape, extending far to the westward, climbing in hills towards the deep blue skyline, hills on which the trees stood out like alluring green peaks.

"I don't want to think about last year," she said, as she looked into their places on the charts, the different colored headings denoting number of blind children, etc. "I forget it," she continued, "excepting when I talk a good deal about it, or people ask me questions. Then the terrible noise of the bombing comes back to me. Contrast this year? I should think it is over in the soldiers' club the other night some of the men who had been through it were talking to me about it. I want to forget it."

SEVERAL CHANGES IN METHODIST PULPITS

Several changes in local Methodist churches will mark the close of the conference year. Rev. J. E. Holmes of Ridout Street Methodist Church, president of the conference, goes to Trinity Church, Stratford. Rev. Knowles, and it is understood the stationing committee will consider with favor such arrangements.

Rev. J. A. Agnew of Clinton is mentioned as successor to Rev. J. E. Holmes in Ridout Street Church, and Rev. S. J. Kelly of Owen Sound to succeed Rev. F. L. Barber, who goes to Toronto.

COURT OF REVISION HEARS MANY APPEALS

The court of revision heard about thirty appeals against taxes. Most of them were by people who had received income tax notices and who claim that they had not been in employment during the whole of the year for which they were taxed. Those who were able to substantiate their claim got remission. Three were soldiers, who had been overseas in the army during the period for which they were asked to pay income tax. In a few other cases the applicants had become householders, and taxes were remitted.

Several applicants against business tax were heard, and the court explained that under a city bylaw it had no power to act in these cases. It was explained that appeals against business assessments only could be heard and not against taxes themselves.
