

TECHNICAL SCHOOL WILL TRAIN PUPILS FOR VARSITY MATRIC

Board Engages A. D. Hone,
Science Specialist, as
Headmaster.

TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL

To Cater Especially To Stu-
dents For University Ap-
plied Science.

A. D. Hone of Peterborough, qualified science specialist and high school principal, has been engaged as headmaster of the technical school by Principal H. Beal, subject to the approval of the board of education.

When the board confirms the appointment it will give the London technical school the rank of technical high school and the power to prepare pupils for matriculation, similar to the college at the college, as it is thought that at least 50 students in matriculation can be accepted at once without enlarging the staff or changing the timetable. Thirty other pupils could be accepted, and if new teachers are engaged additional space used, 175 pupils could be accommodated making a total attendance of 225. Principals of the matriculation classes are engaged in the technical day classes already, in comparison to 94 last year.

D. H. Weir has been engaged as a draughting and academic instructor. He is a graduate of the School of Practical Science, and has had experience as an academic teacher.

The evening classes will open the first Monday in October, and the special art classes will also be continued.

Trains for S. P. S. The staff of the school is now organized to handle matriculation for the School of Practical Science, with qualified specialists in science, mathematics, English and history, and qualified high school teachers for all the work of the matriculation department. The school is now in a position to specially cater to students who desire to take matriculation for the School of Applied Science and the household science department of the university. The special advantages of the matriculation course provided in the technical school are that, in addition to the regular matriculation courses, it provides practical training which is directly preparatory to the engineering courses and the household science courses of the university.

Advantages Not Realized. Principal Beal stated at the meeting that the majority of citizens did not realize the advantages which the technical school offered. It was tradition that the only road to success was the Collegiate Institute and the professions, whereas many boys were gifted for vocations other than professional. Parents were anxious to have their children trained for the professions, but that steps might be taken to supply vocational guidance, which Mr. Beal characterized as the greatest need of the schools today. William Reid did not think this would be of much use. Many new-fangled notions were being brought into the schools, but he declared, the world today was not a bit better than it was 40 years ago.

COMMITTEE GETS PETITION AGAINST CROSSTOWN LINE

Recommends Toronto Appeal
For London Against Phone
Rates Increase.

The cross-town line established by the street railway on Rectory street is not proving satisfactory to most East London residents, and the matter of changing the arrangement was referred to the special street railway committee by No. 1 committee of the city council at a meeting Wednesday afternoon.

W. Wakeman presented a petition against the present service which had so many names on it that it was nearly as long as the petition for the cross-town line. The petition was signed by J. W. Cunliffe and E. R. Dennis of the housing commission appeared in connection with building. Richter definitely declining to reconsider the petition from the commission.

Ask Auto Parking Field. A letter was received from a chamber of commerce, asking the committee to consider the advisability of establishing a parking field for automobiles. A space at least 600 yards square will be required for this. Further information will be required from the chamber. The committee will recommend that the city of Toronto represent London in appealing against the increase in Bell Telephone rates.

Aldermen E. S. Little and S. R. Mansness were appointed a special committee to deal with the question of preparing information on the federal square site and the building of a new city hall, for presentation to the electors at the next elections.

Mayor C. R. Somerville and Ald. Little were appointed to look into the revision of 1920 assessment. Cannot Exempt Property. A request was received from the Great War Veterans' Association, asking that the council exercise its powers to exempt the property of returned soldiers from taxation up to an assessment of \$3,000. Chairman Little said that they could do nothing, and the communication was filed.

SOUTH AFRICAN GOVT. TO CONTROL OUTPUT OF THE DIAMOND MINES

Cape Town, South Africa, Sept. 17.—During committee stage in the assembly on the mandate bill in connection with South Africa, Hon. Mr. De Wet, minister of justice, stated that the system of administration and taxation in Southwest Africa would be gradually assimilated with that of the union. Hon. Mr. Milner, minister of justice, declared that the diamond output of Southwest Africa would be compulsorily handed over to the Union Government for disposal. The government would be guided by an advisory board on which the diamond producers would be represented.

STUDENTS' RE-ESTABLISHMENT COMMISSION DOES FINE WORK AMONG TUBERCULOUS

From Moment Sick Veteran Enters Institution At Byron He
Is Under Best of Treatment and Provided With
Home and Interests of the Best.

Few people in the city and district round about it realize the magnitude and efficiency of the work being done by the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Commission, working in conjunction with the military hospitals.

Take for example, the tuberculous soldier alone. And his case is but one type considered. Call him Private Lung. As soon as Pte. Lung has been brought home to Military District No. 1, becomes the care of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Commission here. If the medical board pronounces him fit, or if T. B. suspect, he is sent to the best place in the district for leading him back to a state of normal health against the Byron Sanatorium for Tuberculous Soldiers.

Everything Up-to-Date. This institution, composed of a number of the most up-to-date and scientifically equipped buildings, is situated directly behind the civilian sanatorium, and is perhaps often overlooked by the citizens of London. They do not realize that for the soldiers there has been built practically another hospital.

The big central building is known as the "Infirmary," and here all the admissions are made. Pte. Lung on arrival is given the most thorough examination and kept there under observation for a month. If he is found to be very ill he is kept there, but if his condition will allow he is sent passed on to the big new "Pavilion," where he must be under strict medical inspection, but may go about as he likes, visiting the city and so forth.

Real Hospital. The Infirmary, of all the buildings, is most like a hospital. The patients' quarters are situated in four complete hospital wings, each wing built in two compartments, the inner compartment heated and the outer sunroom, admitting quantities of pure, fresh air and sunshine. Very few of the patients, even here, remain in bed all day. There are comfortable recreation and smoking rooms in each wing.

In the Infirmary Building is a modern, fully-equipped examining room, with double doors to preserve the absolute quiet necessary for chest examinations; a fine eye, ear, nose and throat department for minor operations, often necessary in tuberculous cases; an up-to-date, fully-equipped operating room with pure oxygen, anaesthetic, a modern dental room with fine equipment, an X-ray room with fluoroscope and accompanying apparatus for development and reading of plates; the best possible sterilizing room, and a splendidly equipped laboratory for research work, where the T. B. bug is constantly in a state of incubation for observation.

The greater number of these splendidly equipped departments have been placed in the hospital through the kindness of various patriotic organizations throughout Western Ontario, and bear their names in brass plates on the doors.

The dining-room at the Infirmary serves all the patients in the entire military portion of the sanatorium. A cafeteria system being used. Everything is perfectly sterile here, and the tables being pure white and made of a combination resembling marble. About 300 patients can be seated at a time. The huge kitchens in the Infirmary are fitted with every convenience for saving labor and preparing the best cooked articles of diet. Electric stoves, ovens, huge dish-washers, and potato cleaners are used. An ice-making plant, huge refrigerators, cooling room for meat and milk house add to the efficiency of the main kitchen. In addition to the main kitchen, there is a diet kitchen, situated directly above it, and connected by means of a dumb waiter, where special diets are prepared for patients needing them.

And all this splendid building was erected and equipped to help Pte. Lung on his way to civil life once more.

After his month is up and he is found to be fit for transfer to quarters in one of the large outside wards, he leaves the Infirmary, and if he is fortunate, may go home.

PRINCE WILL OPEN \$10,000 NAVY LEAGUE CAMPAIGN IN CITY

To Aid Dependents of Sailors
Killed or Maimed in
War.

The chamber of commerce, a representative of the mayor, and other prominent citizens last night indicated the plans of the Navy League in this city to have the Prince of Wales open a campaign during his visit here on October 23, for \$10,000 to aid dependents of sailors who lost their lives in the war.

The prince will wear the uniform of a naval officer during his visit to London in honor of the Navy League, according to Mrs. Harry Reynolds, organizer of the League.

The campaign to secure \$10,000 will conclude on October 25 with a tag day in aid of the fund. The chamber of commerce board rooms at the Tecumseh House will be used by the League as headquarters. The charter of the organization is now hung there. The League has the support of the chamber of commerce, and the mayor last night, through Alderman Seabrook, expressed his appreciation of the work of the Navy League and his co-operation with the plans of the association in the coming campaign.

Elect Officers. Herbert Gates was elected chairman of the Navy League, to take the place of E. B. Smith, retiring. W. W. Vainwright was chosen vice-chairman (temporary), and George J. Reid, addressing the meeting, outlined the work of the Navy League. The organization here is a new one, having been organized in England, May 1918, by Rev. S. Boal, of England, who addressed the Rotary Club and the chamber of commerce in this city.

Work Accomplished. Outstanding work of the League here was the summer week campaign of last year, when nearly \$25,000 was raised to aid sailors and dependents; Christmas parcels and comfort collections; the educational campaign in alliance with the I. O. D. E., and the exhibition of naval photographs recently.

J. P. Watt declared a keen interest in the work of organizing educational classes in connection with the Navy League.

The officers of the five-reel motion picture film will be shown under its auspices in a local theatre soon, entitled "The Life of Nelson." The Navy League possesses the exclusive rights in Canada to exhibit this picture, which is a dramatic feature film of the life of Admiral Lord Nelson, portraying the heroic and dramatic forces in the sea son's life, woven together with his love romance.

EXPECTS THE WORLD TO BE CHRISTIANIZED WITHIN A DECADE

Rev. Carl N. Garland of Philadelphia Tells Methodists
Time Is Propitious.

Owosso, Mich., Sept. 17.—That the hour has struck for a wave of evangelism and that it is not unreasonable to expect that the entire world will be Christianized within a decade, was the statement made this afternoon by Rev. Carl N. Garland of Philadelphia, speaking before the Detroit conference here.

He declared that the centenary movement of the Methodist Church to bring about a million conversions in nine months was well timed.

Rev. Mr. Garland declared that never was the un-Christianized world so appealing in its desire to become Christianized and that the world could never forget the responsibilities of the Christian people if they ignored these appeals. He asserted that the church of today needs a spiritual awakening to its responsibility in winning souls and declared that the laymen must cease leading this mission to their pastors. Sixty million people in the United States would be a force.

May Turn Over Paper. The conference has under consideration a proposal from the board of directors of the Christian Advocate, official paper of the church, to turn over the paper, gratis to the Michigan and Detroit conferences, after liquidation of the stock. If the proposal is accepted the directors will be chosen by the conference members and its policies directed by the conference members. A vote will be taken probably Friday on whether or not laymen delegates shall vote on the same basis with pastors at the general conference hereafter.

have never accepted Christ, he said, because they have not been asked.

He characterized this as one of the tragedies of the country today. He pointed out that of the 35,000 Methodist churches, only 6,000 have shown a gain in conversions in the last year. He said that evangelism must take on a definiteness in purpose that has been lacking in the past.

Rev. W. W. Diehl of Detroit, speaking on rural evangelism, asserted that this was the most difficult problem facing the church today and declared that unless rural evangelism is carried on, the city churches will fall because the rural churches are the springs that feed the city churches with pastors and members. And that the country churches are suffering from the farm to city movement. He asserted that any rural minister who was lazy would fall down in his work because farmers won't go to hear a man preach whom they know is lazy.

Rev. Mr. Sheldon of the conference board of education, told the conference that hundreds of young people brought up in Methodist homes, were drifting away from the church because of lack of special workers at the universities and colleges. He then touched with the church. He said that unless something is done to provide these workers the work of the Methodist ministry would be a force.

All conferences throughout the country are voting on the same question.
