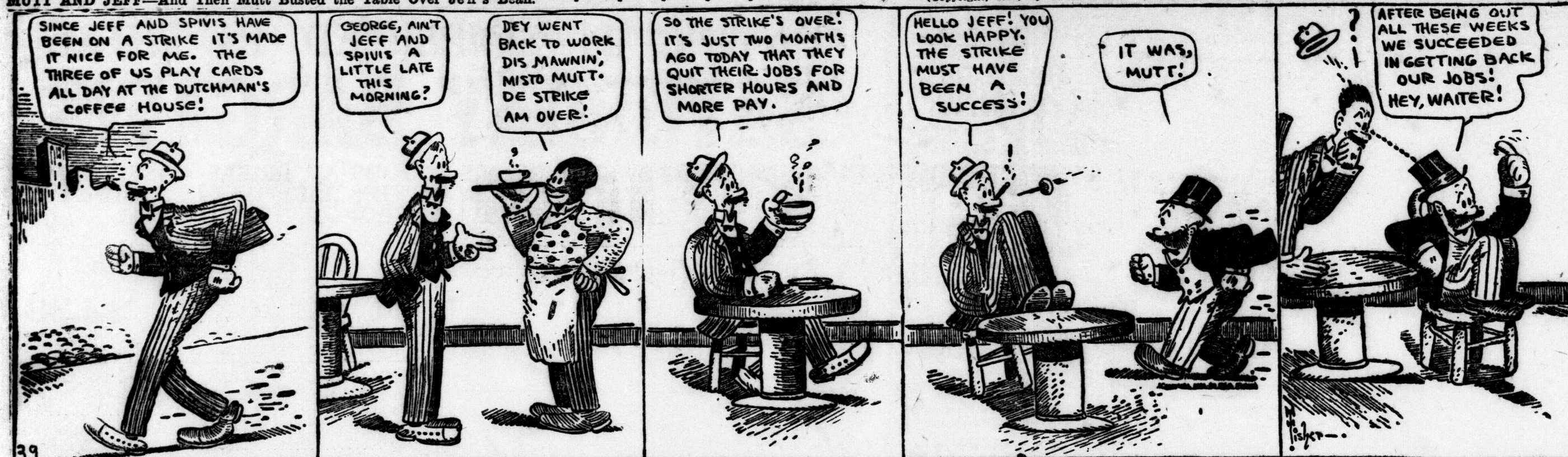

Two Curlers To Be Selected Yet For the Old Land Tour

TORONTO, Nov. 11.—Five members of the Ontario curling team, who will accompany the Canadian team on the tour of Scotland in January met at the Victoria Club yesterday, when they chose a grey uniform with Norfolk jacket, grey sweater and peak cap to match. Each curler will wear a very prominent and quite distinctive Canadian badge, a beautiful creation of silver and enamel that says "Canada" to all beholders. They will also carry 100 small counterparts of the larger badge for distribution among their Scottish friends. Transportation and other arrangements were completed at yesterday's gathering.

Col. McKenzie of Sarnia, and Dr. McKendrick of Galt, announced that they cannot accompany the team. Dr. McKendrick is expected to fill one of the vacancies. PIMLICO MEMBER MOBBED BECAUSE JOCKEY WASN'T UP

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 11.—Joseph P. Kennedy, a member of the Maryland Racing Commission, today was attacked by the crowd at the Pimlico race track and severely beaten. Both men and women were among his assailants.

A woman, using a folded program, was the first to strike him. Then a man in the crowd hit him a heavy blow behind the ear. Others joined in, but Mr. Kennedy managed to dodge some of the blows. A physician's examination tonight revealed that Mr. Kennedy was suffering with a broken finger, severe bruises on the body and the effects of the blow on his head. He was ordered to bed. Belief on the part of the crowd that Kennedy was responsible for Frankie Keogh riding "Buck" Foreman's horse Manoeuvre, instead of Jockey Carroll Shilling, is thought to have been responsible for the attack. The assault came immediately after Kennedy had a conference with members of the Maryland Jockey Club race officials. J. K. L. Ross and Jockey Shilling, relative to the latter's riding Manoeuvre in the seventh race.

Shilling was granted a license to ride today by the Maryland Jockey Club, after the latter was warned by the Maryland Racing Commission that a refusal would bring about the revocation of his license to conduct racing at Pimlico. The Maryland Racing Commission was prepared to see that Shilling should ride if Ross had not withdrawn his consent. "If any effort had been made to have brought the horses on the track with Shilling on Manoeuvre, we would have stood with the aid of the police. When Ross decided that Shilling should not accept the mount that ended the matter so far as we are concerned. The Maryland Jockey Club abided by our decision. We will be at Pimlico tomorrow to sustain our decision in the Shilling case," Mr. Kennedy added. He has our permission a license and nothing can prevent him from riding if anyone cares to employ him besides Ross. Mr. Guy Pedwell, who trains for Ross, said that Shilling would have the mount on Boniface in the Pimlico Cup race, which is the fourth on the card tomorrow.

MINORS APPOINT SIX TO MEET MAJORS IN A REORGANIZATION

Is In Event of War Being Called Off by Factions.

MAINES IS MEMBER

Will Represent Class "B" Minors On New Committee Named.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 11.—The National Association of Minor Leagues today appointed a committee of six to meet with the American and National Leagues to draw up a new governing body of organized baseball. H. S. Sinton of Rock Island, Illinois, president of the National Association, will be chairman of the committee. The other members will be Thomas J. Hickey, president of the American Association, representing the Class A leagues; John D. Martin, president of the Southern Association, representing the Class B leagues; George H. Maines, president of the Michigan-Ontario League, representing Class C leagues; Wm. Walsh, president of the South Atlantic League, representing Class C leagues; and J. W. Morris, president of the West Texas League, representing Class D leagues.

This committee will meet the majors, providing they succeed in settling their 1921 contract with the National Association of Minor Leagues.

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Canucks Keep the Yanks on Jump in Athletics

Hek Says Supremacy Is Long Way Off, But Competition Is Good.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—We have got to look to our laurels in sports. The Canadians are after us. Two important events have occurred which indicate very strongly that our northern neighbors are going to be formidable sporting contenders. The first was the challenge for the America cup, which reached this country after Sir Thomas Lipton had tried to lift the famous yachting trophy and had again failed. The second was the offering of a \$75,000 purse for the recent match race between Man o' War and Sir Barton.

Both these things are significant of the trend of the thought and times in Canada. Until very recently the Canadians have given most of their thought to developing their country. Now they are going to develop sports from a great big international standpoint. It will take time.

The Canadians who participated in the Olympic games did well. Those who take part next year probably will do better. Every year they are going to give the athletes representing the United States a harder tussle.

Don't picture me as saying that the Canadians are going to capture the Olympic games championship next year, or in 1922, or by 1925, for that matter, but you can write it down in your mental tablet right now that every year the Canadians are going to better their previous records.

It is a good thing for all concerned that we have got the Canadians to watch. This should serve to prevent any decadence in American amateur sports. We have got to keep on our toes.

There is nothing like competition in good, honest sport to cement international relations. So let's welcome the Canadians. We will try hard to keep them from licking us, but if they do, we will be glad it took people produced on the American continent to do it.
