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A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

The policy that the Government has laid down in connection with the Crow's Nest Railway naturally leads up to the organization of a railway commission. The regulation of freight rates is being assumed more and more by the Government of this country as it has been assumed by the Government of the United States. The limited control that the Government has obtained over the C. P. R. in return for the three million dollar bonus granted that railway will be of little avail unless it is assumed and taken advantage of. The Railway Committee of the Privy Council is not properly constituted for adjusting the rates of freight. It is a public body. If Government control is to be of any practical benefit to the people it must be administered by an independent and specially qualified body. The time has arrived for the appointment of a railway commission to equalize freight rates and prevent unfair discriminations. Such an organization ought to be free from political bias. Its functions should be judicial and the public should have ready access to it at all times for the rectification of grievances and complaints.

The comparatively poor showing of the Intercolonial under state control has no doubt had a deterring effect on absolute state control of a railway policy. But the Government might have assumed a larger share of control over the C. P. R. in return for the large bonus that has been granted the railway. For the fact must not be lost sight of that the Crow's Nest Railway is a good business proposition in itself. Mr. Heinze, Mr. Corbin, and other railway men who know the country, would have undertaken to build the line without a dollar bonus, provided they controlled the charter of the British Columbia Southern Railway. The Globe itself admitted that the Crow's Nest will be a paying line. Why then should the Government bonus it to the extent of \$11,000 a mile? The bonus represents probably two-thirds of the cost of building the road. Three hundred and a half million dollars is a large sum to pay for the concessions which the people have obtained from the Railway Company. As far as the building of the road was concerned the Government was not called upon to contribute a cent. We regard the bonus altogether as the price of the control the Government has obtained over freight rates. The grant to the Government of the 50,000 acres of coal lands is not part consideration for the three and a half million dollar bonus. The Government could itself have acquired possession of the whole coal fields without infringing on the rights of the C. P. R. at all. The only concessions the Government could not directly have secured without making a bargain with the C. P. R. are those relating to freight rates. Isn't three and a half million dollars an extravagant price to pay for the concessions we have obtained in this respect? We believe it is. If the Government had assumed a more aggressive attitude towards the C. P. R. a better bargain could have been arranged. The most that can be said of the deal is that it is in the right direction. It is a step towards the appointment of a railway commission which the Government doubt has in contemplation. It will be the duty of this commission to see that our control of the Crow's Nest Railway is no mere paper concession. If other railways desire to see the line must be secured in their right to do so on equitable terms. Similarly the Denver River Railway must be held open to all comers. A bonus will probably be given this line also. If so, Parliament should retain the ample power to give running rights over it to all other roads, to regulate freight rates, and generally to control the road in the interests of the public.

THE EMPHATIC FOOD SUPPLY.

The question of England's food supply is one of increasing interest to Imperial statesmen. There is constantly staring them in the face the alarming fact that within the confines of the British Isles there is not, on an average, sufficient wheat and flour to supply the population for more than four weeks. Mr. H. Seton-Karr, M.P., has an interesting article on this subject in the June number of The North American Review. The statistics he furnishes form the foundation work of an Imperial policy in which Canada is as vitally interested as any other part of the Empire. We learn that the annual consumption of wheat and flour in the United Kingdom amounts to 28,000,000 quarters of 480 pounds. Of this amount 10,000,000 quarters are imported from foreign countries, chiefly from the United States, Russia and the Argentine Republic. From British possessions, India, Canada and Australia, between 8,000,000 and 4,000,000 quarters are imported. The balance of the annual consumption, about 5,000,000 quarters, is produced within the United Kingdom. Another way of showing the dependence of Great Britain upon the outside world for her food supply is the statement of the fact that five out of every six of the population of the British Isles are fed on imported breadstuffs, and four out of five, two-thirds of the whole, are fed on breadstuffs of foreign origin. While Great Britain is almost wholly dependent upon other countries for her food supplies, all the other great powers are practically self-supporting within their own borders. France is self-maintained. Russia and the United States are not only self-supporting but are the two greatest grain-exporting countries in the world. Germany, Austria and Italy, the countries forming the Triple Alliance, produce about three-quarters of their national requirements of the necessities of life. England alone, with the widest Empire and the largest industrial population, is the solitary exception, and lives from hand to mouth. While Mr. Seton-Karr does not consider war between Great Britain and the United States as at all probable, and only remotely possible, he admits that, so far as Europe is concerned, a European war in the immediate future is quite possible. In the event of war Great Britain would have an immense coast line to protect, and a vast extent of sea to patrol, and the only way to secure the population, is the solitary exception, and lives from hand to mouth.
