

TABLET TO MEMORY OF HEROES OF WAR

Forty-Three Men From District Made Supreme Sacrifice in Conflict

WYCHWOOD

The Church of St. Michael and All Angels, Wychwood, was filled to capacity, yesterday morning at the dedication of the memorial tablets which was unveiled by Major-General V. A. Williams, C. M. G., G. O. C., in memory of the 43 fallen men of the parish, and a brass tablet in memory of Pte. Ernest Monckton. A window in memory of Gunner Kenneth Macdonald, was later unveiled by his father, Capt. John A. Macdonald, a veteran of 1866.

The speaker, Canon W. L. Baynes, Field, D. S. O. (chaplain of the 75th Battalion) outlined the value of all the sacrifices endured by Canada, and expressed his belief that better things would come from all the trouble and sufferings.

Major-Gen. Williams was attended by Brig.-Gen. Sir Henry Pellatt and Col. Brooks, Rev. Canon Capt. Elliott Baker, returned chaplain also took part in the service, which was under the direction of Re. Canon W. J. Braslin. His Worship, the mayor, and other prominent citizens were in the congregation.

A \$25k standard was carried on the procession by Lieut. Eric H. Jones, D. C. M., the first boy who enlisted from the Hill, and a processional cross (presented to the church in memory of a son of the church) was borne by a member of the choir.

The tablet is a beautiful piece of work fourteen feet long by three feet deep, and is of white marble surrounded by a brown marble frame. The names of the boys who loved not their lives unto the death, were cut in old English letters, filled in with blue and red enamel. The carving was done as a labor of love by Vol. 26, of the parish, and the design was taken from the Smith & Wrenn well-known architect.

The church is a fine brick structure, with a square tower, Gothic style, and seats about 120 persons. The pews are solid ash and the communion rail and fittings are in black and gold. Just inside the door is a stone font. The basement, which is not quite finished, will be used

The church, when completely finished, will cost \$8000. Many of the fittings are memorials. Twenty members of the congregation went overseas and two paid the supreme sacrifice.

In the evening the service was conducted by Dr. Hallam of Wycliffe College, Toronto. The rector of the new church will be Rev. Alfred Clark.
