

would, on an average be an expenditure of above  
\$300. on each farm; and if properly done would  
put the farms in such condition, that if the occu-  
pants would work, they would soon have abundance.  
And then as regards the Aged, Widows &c. it  
would put their farms in such a condition that  
they could readily let them on shares, and so secure  
an abundance of food.

I am quite well aware  
that many objections may be urged against such  
a scheme as this; and that there would be  
great difficulties in carrying it out. Some  
are so lazy that though every thing were made  
right for them, they would still be, as they  
themselves express it, always "hard up". Yet I  
think there are quite a number who would  
greatly benefit by such a scheme, if honestly  
and thoroughly carried out.
