Tris Speaker Joins Strikers
New York, Jan. 27.—Tris Speaker, Al Demaree and at least thirty other baseball players, ranging in station from Boston Red Sox and the Brooklyn Dodgers to American Association and International League clubs, are reported in their decision to stand by Dave L. Pultz and his strike of ball players until the figurative cows wander homewards.
Thirty gathered on Thursday night in New York to hear Pultz speak, and were surprised by two telegrams—one from Tris Speaker vowing allegiance to the fraternity, and the other from Al Demaree announcing that he never had said he would not strike and inviting Pultz to make that statement just as strong as he pleased.

ENGLISH ATHLETES PROMINENT IN MILITARY HONORS
London, Jan. 27.—British sportsmen make an exceedingly good showing in list of militia honors issued a few days ago. Polo, football, cricket, boxing, racing and golf were all represented by men who have made their names famous in their respective sports.
The Field Marshal, Sir Douglas Haig was in his more athletic days a fine polo player, having represented Oxford University against Cambridge in 1887 and 1888. He subsequently won distinction in inter-regimental competitions.
Edgar H. Meibis, a famous English international rugby footballer, who enlisted as a private at the outbreak of the war and afterward raised a company for the Northampton Regiment, composed chiefly of rugby footballers, worked his way up to the rank of lieutenant-colonel and is now awarded the Distinguished Service Order.
