

Dismissed After Being Reinstated Following False Charge.

WAS POSTAL CLERK

Bill Before House Asks for \$13,793 and Restoration of Place.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16. — The story of a man who was unjustly accused thirteen years ago of stealing \$80 from a post office, whose arrest was declared by the judge who tried him and the prosecuting attorney to be an outrage and who now at more than 70 years of age seeks to recover from the Government the pay he lost while begging for reinstatement in the postal service is revealed by a bill introduced in Congress by Representative Andrew J. Montague of Virginia and placed by the claims committee of the House in charge of Representative Emanuel Celler of Brooklyn, a member of the committee.

"I conscientiously believe that a rank injustice has been done Mr. Taylor by the Government, and it should be rectified before he dies, he being an old man," said Mr. Montague in discussing the case. "Postmasters General Hays and New concurred in thinking this bill would, if passed, afford an unwise precedent. I entertain no such grounds of apprehension, for the simple and obvious reason that in all human probability no similar case will ever arise again, but should such a case occur the precedent should afford comfort and satisfaction to all who would do justice or show mercy."
