SKATING.

Wins Championship.

Springfield, Mass., Jan. 25.—Walter A. Thorne, of the B. A. A., New England, won the Gold Cup, which is the prize for the winner of all the five events yesterday in the Central Massachusetts open championship.

What They Think of Jewrow.

The skating season thus far can just about be summed up in the performances of Charles Jewrow of Lake Placid. If any doubt about his ability existed prior to the Gold Cup race at Plattsburgh last week it was dispelled by his showing in that meet. In the three-day tournament at Plattsburgh Jewrow tied Maurice Wood's world record of 10 seconds for the 220-yard dash, won that event, won the 440, the three-quarter mile, the mile, and then finished second in the half and three-mile races. Truly a wonderful performance for three days of competition.

Jewrow not only won the Plattsburgh meet, but he led his nearest rival, Richard Donovan of Johnson City, by 160 points to 80. As a result of the meeting and the one at Johnson City which preceded it, Jewrow has now scored 380 points toward winning the Gold Cup which goes with the Adirondack championship, and Donovan is second with 120 points in the total score.

The final meet will be skated at Lake Placid beginning Feb. 8 and only a miracle will prevent Jewrow's winning the title. Nor is the Gold Cup the only competition in which Jewrow has a commanding lead in points. In the Maxwell "800 point" cup, which will also be skated for the Lake Placid meet, Jewrow has 180 points against 150 for Joe Moore of New York and 140 for William Stelmets of Chicago.

The Maxwell Cup, a three-foot silver trophy presented by Harry Maxwell of New York, will be won outright by the first skater scoring 300 points in the major skating meets held annually at Lake Placid.

If Jewrow can continue the fast pace he set at Johnson City and Plattsburgh he will come out of the Lake Placid tests with both the Maxwell Cup and the Adirondack championship, which will make the meet a banner one indeed for him.

SHOULD LICENSE
BALL PLAYERS

Ban Johnson, President of the American League, is in Favor of Such a Bill.

Boston, Jan. 25.—President Ban Johnson of the American League is in favor of licensing ball players. As a condition to being licensed, each player should be required to pass a thorough examination, he thinks. Licenses would be revocable for misconduct on the field or off. The league leader's opinion was expressed in a letter received today by Joseph A. Collier of this city, who has introduced a bill in the Legislature providing for the licensing of professional baseball players in this State.

President Johnson's letter in part follows:

"To license a ball player is unique. It is my thought that each individual should pass a thorough examination before he is granted a license. It occurred to me a board could be created, for this purpose and the funds for its maintenance could be secured by an assessment against all Sunday games where admissions are charged throughout Massachusetts.

"The conduct and habit of a professional player should be of necessity be of a high order, as he serves as an example to the young men of our country. As you can well understand, a player should conform to all rules so imperative in the making of a perfect athlete. He should abstain absolutely from the use of intoxicating liquors, and his deportment on and off the field should be of high order.

"In failing to comply with the requirements prescribed, the license should be revoked. By this course of procedure we would insure to professional ball a better class of men.

"I would be glad to co-operate with you at any time in the furtherance of your legislation."

Mr. Collier's bill provides that all persons playing baseball where an admission fee is charged, or a collection taken up, must be licensed by a State commission. Violations would be punished by sentence of 30 days in jail. Provision is made for temporary licenses good for three days, issuable by chiefs of police.

Any attempt to fix the result of a game would be punished by a sentence of from one to twenty years. Any betting or pools on baseball games would be punished by a sentence of from thirty days to twenty years.

Sunday baseball would be permitted on condition that 25 per cent. of the proceeds go to churches.

President Johnson said he would have the money devoted to charity instead of to churches, and said that any effort to strike at the gambling element in baseball had his full support.
