SAYS LABOR KEEPS IMMIGRANTS OUT

New York Times Raps the Unions' Attitude as Hindering Canada's Progress.

New York, May 11.—Organized labor in Canada is blamed by the Times for the lack of immigration into the Dominion.

After referring to statements made in the House of Commons recently that Canada can assimilate 400,000 immigrants a year, the Times asks: "Why, then, doesn't she allow them to come in according to those judicious selective processes which she had the reputation of using?"

Why has the Minister (of the interior), proposed to Parliament plans that can result in the introduction of only a scanty part of the assimilable number of immigrants?"

Answering its own questions, it says, "Because organized labor forbids. Agricultural laborers have to be admitted to conciliate the powerful farmers. To the middle class is granted a quota of domestic servants. Organized labor orders the door shut against all other labor and so hopes to maintain its monopoly. That policy is intelligible and is practiced in the United States, a highly developed industrial country. The Canadian situation is different."

"Canada has an immense area and a sparse population. It is to be content with being a mainly agricultural community? That unilateral growth, that neglect or hampering of industrial growth must react on farming, which would benefit greatly from the springing up of towns and cities of industry, to be fed by the farmers. It injures the railroads, which have had so great a part in building up the Dominion. It checks the influx of foreign capital. Incidentally, it is an anti-imperial policy, since immigration is one of the recognized and currently advocated remedies for British unemployment. Canadian organized labor should have learned from the United States that the higher the industrial development the greater is the power of organized labor."

CANADIAN CLUBS PREPARING FOR BIG CONVENTION

Victoria, B. C., May 11.—Arrangements for the annual convention of the Association of Canadian Clubs which is to be held in Victoria on September 17, 18 and 19 are well in hand, and the indications are that this gathering will surpass any previous event of its kind in interest, enlightenment and enjoyment.

It is expected that at least two special trains will be required to convey the delegates to and from the scene of the conference, and the transcontinental railway companies have promised to make special arrangements to see that the delegates are able to see it at any other time.


One trainload will come to Victoria via the Canadian Pacific railway, stopping long enough at principal points on the way to enable them to enjoy the entertainment provided by the Canadian Clubs at those places. They will side trip down the Arrow Lakes.

The other party will come on the Canadian National, visiting the chief centres and Jasper Park and transferring from the train to steamer at Prince Rupert.

The delegates will spend three and a half days in Victoria, returning to the mainland via Nanaimo. On the way back across the continent the parties will reverse their routes. The Montreal and Quebec delegates which will come west by the Canadian Pacific will journey to Prince Rupert by steamer and there take the Canadian National eastward, while the Ontario party, which will come west on the Canadian National, will return via the Canadian Pacific.

There are more than one hundred Canadian Clubs in the Association, whose membership comprises representatives of every branch of Canadian activity, and it is expected that the delegates will include the foremost men and women in the life of the Dominion. It is hoped also that the delegates will include New York, Boston, Chicago and other places in the United States where such organizations have
