

PINNED UNDER WRECKED CAR AND DROWNED

Fellow Workmen Hold
Brakeman's Head Half
Hour, But Rising Tide En-
gulfed Him.

Erving, Mass., Dec. 6.—E. Hobbs, a brakeman, is dead and C. A. Clark, engineer, of Greenfield, and Geo. Norton, fireman of Ayer, are missing as the result of a Boston and Maine freight train eastbound from Deerfield running into a westbound passenger train at Erving Mills, just before midnight on Saturday. The engine and ten cars plunged into Miller's River.

Brakeman Hobbs was found pinned under one of the cars in the river with his head just above water. Fireman Hathway and Engineer Wm. Radloff, of Erving, members of the "pusher" of the westbound freight which came along just after the accident held Hobbs' head above water half an hour, but the rising flood finally immersed the unfortunate man and he had to be left to his fate.

EXTRA DAY FOR TARIFF HEARING

Toronto Session Extended—
One Firm Wants No Tariff
at All—Luxury Tax Ob-
jections.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—So many people have wished to give evidence before the tariff commission here that the four day sitting originally planned has been extended to a sixth day today.

On Saturday one concern objected to the proposed increase in the tariff on glass, and another, the Anson Company, which sells photographic cameras, films and chemicals, and contended that the company might engage in manufacture, as well as in sales, if it were not for the tariff. They contended that only one company in the business had been offered by the tariff, and competition in Canada had been stifled thereby.

With regard to the luxury tax, E. B. Walker of this city, said that the attempt to enforce the luxury tax regulations on millinery had "resulted in many an acrimonious dispute. Miss Wright, also in the millinery business, entered a protest against being taxed both as a manufacturer and as a retailer. She particularly objects to the luxury tax.
