### E. Allan Schofield Will Be St. John's New Mayor

Elected by Good Margin Over John A. Chesley Yesterday—Commissioner Thornton Re-elected and Dr. J. H. Frink Will Succeed Commissioner Fisher.

E. Allan Schofield was the successful candidate for the mayoralty at yesterday's election and the voters returned John Thornton, commissioner of public safety, by a big majority and elected Dr. J. H. Frink to fill the office left vacant by the defeat at the primaries of Commissioner Fisher.

The successful candidates addressed a number of the electors who gathered at city hall last night to hear the official announcement of the returns. The mayor-elect and Mayor Hayes were heard in speeches at the Rotary Club dinner last evening.

#### WHERE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS MADE

Their Manufacture is Home Industry of Czech-Slovak Villagers.

Within a radius of six or seven miles from Schonbach, Czech-Slovakia, there are twenty-one villages whose inhabitants are employed in the manufacture of stringed musical instruments, writes United States Trade Commissioner Vladimir A. Geringer, from Prague. Of the 6,000 residents of Schonbach almost 4,000 are engaged in this home industry, among them both women and children. In the making of one instrument many different workers take part.

Not more than fifteen miles from Schonbach is the town of Kraslice (Grasslitz) where brass and wind instruments, such as trumpets, cornets, trombones, clarinets, flutes, etc., are manufactured, as well as home industry products. Kraslice Hradec is also noted for its production of brass and wind instruments.

In addition to the towns of Schonbach and Kraslice (Grasslitz) and the surrounding villages there are many manufacturers of musical instruments scattered through Czech-Slovakia whose products are exported to all parts of the world. Many of the instruments normally bring high prices, because of their exceptionally fine tone and quality. Outside of pianos and organs, they are produced mostly by small manufacturers.

#### GETS ON VERY WELL IN HIS HUMBLE POST

The Pas, Man., April 27.—Sixteen hundred freight teams and 1,500 dog teams passed a stopping place at Rocky Lake during the winter according to the landlady there. This is the main trail to Flin-Flon mine. The landlady, Sam Cook, an Indian war veteran, adds that 982 men stayed with him over night. He collects twenty-five cents for each team that puts up there and twenty-five cents from each traveler that eats there. Sam furnishes the dishes, water and fire only and his wife looks after these items while Samuel gamblers in the fees. If there is any grub left the masters usually leave it for their host, and in this way his expenses for feeding himself, wife, two children and a tribe of relations are kept down materially.
