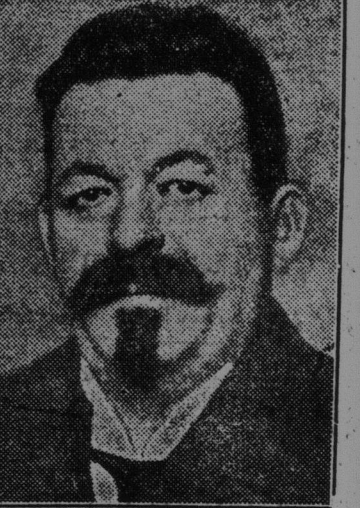

DISMOUNT GUNS OF HELIGOLAND

would henceforth be a new country adding that it would be genuinely democratic and would loyally participate in the league of nations on the principle of political and economical equality. He said that Germany was ready to agree to disarmament on land and sea and in the air.

He admitted that Germany made a mistake in 1871, when she did not consult the people of Alsace and Lorraine as to their fate. He expressed the hope that France would not make the same mistake in annexing Germans without calling a plebiscite.

German Whimpering.
London, Feb. 18.—One of the notes presented by Matthias Erzberger to Marshal Foch at Trevi, complained of the failure of the Entente Allies to commence negotiations at Spa for a financial treaty with Germany, according to a German wireless despatch picked up here.

Detailing futile efforts to obtain amelioration of the new armistice conditions, Erzberger said that Marshal Foch had merely promised to try to interfere with the inter-allied commission for the protection of the Germans in the eastern provinces, in accordance with the views that Erzberger presented. He said that Marshal Foch had declared that the first article of the new agreement was a purely military measure and would have no political effects.

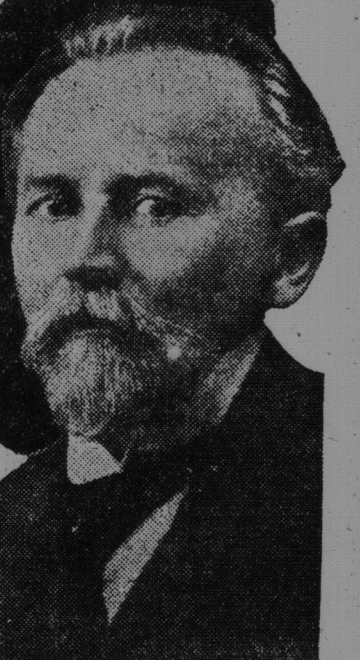
Erzberger, it is said, reported that he regretted being unsuccessful in obtaining any definite promise for the release of German prisoners, although Marshal Foch expressed his willingness to submit the plea to the supreme war council. After saying that he signed the agreement in accordance with the government's instructions, after handing to Marshal Foch a note of protest, Erzberger said: "This is the message, little gratifying in itself, which I have had to bring. The world knows Germany does not wish and is unable to conduct a fresh war, but though it is possible to render its defenceless, we must not be made honorless."

Erzberger Reports.

Erzberger has returned to Weimar, according to a German wireless message. He appeared before the national assembly and read the text of the new armistice agreement. He is reported to have said: "The German commission's activity was kept to the narrowest limits, as Marshal Foch declined to extend the period and declared he was unable to alter anything in the stipulations, since the conditions had been framed by the chiefs of the allied governments. Marshal Foch's interpreter said that President Wilson had approved the conditions of the new armistice."

Foreign Minister Quits.
Basle, Feb. 18.—Count Von Brockdorff-Rantzau, German foreign minister, told the German cabinet on Sunday that he would resign if Germany's conditions in reference to a renewal of the armistice were rejected, according to a Weimar despatch to the Frankfurt Zeitung. He said it would be impossible for him to continue his foreign policy while the French were "notoriously aiming at a resumption of hostilities." When the armistice was signed, the foreign minister resigned. The cabinet requested him to remain in office.

Dr. Edward David, one of the leaders of the German Social Democratic party was elected president of the German national assembly, a position which corresponds to that of Speaker of our House of Commons. He will, however, resign to accept a portfolio in the new ministry.

THE LATE GENERAL SIR SAM STEELE.

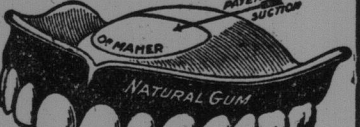

The late Gen. Sir Sam Steele was a man who had a great hold on the imagination of that generation of Canadians who may now be described as middle-aged.

As inspector of the mounted police in the west he made a reputation for a courage equal to any emergency and a tact quite equal to his courage. In the South African war he crowned the reputation he had made in the west. He was in those days a leader whom men followed in from all parts of the world, but he made it as safe and orderly as an eastern township. He disarmed the gunmen at the border, no offence was condoned or forgotten through lapse of time, and wild men learned that there was a great wood-pile at the barracks, where, if they did not behave, they would inevitably spend long days in the drudgery and not at all adventurous task of pushing a buckskin through cordwood. The wild frontier spirits were quite unable to invest with any element of the hero the task of bucking wood for other people's fires.

As fine a tribute as could be paid to any man is contained in the reference to Gen. Steele by the Manitoba Free Press, when it says that in him Canada produced as fine a blend of tact and strength as this continent has known. "No one," it says, "ever knew him to use any more force than was obviously necessary, and no one ever knew him to use less." That is saying everything in a very few words.

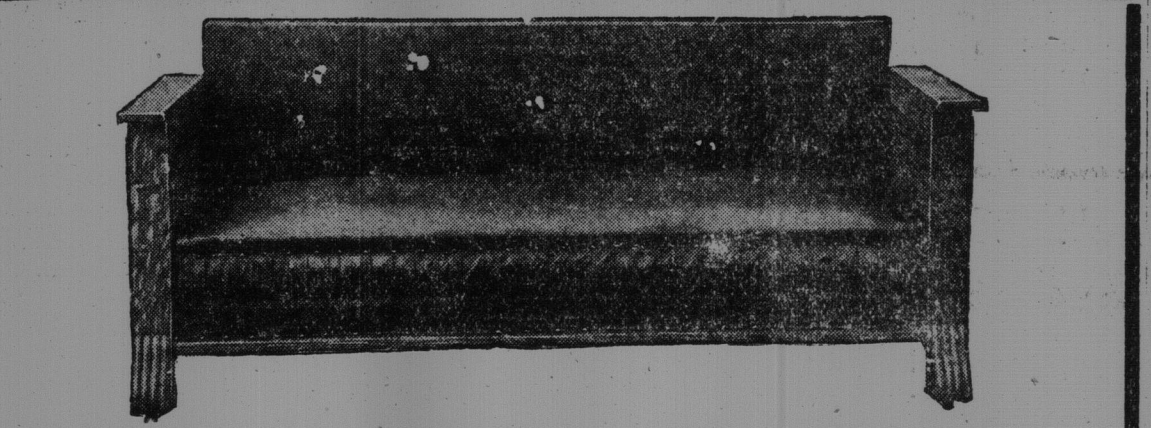
