liant feats of aquatic speed and endurance, its most remarkable feature was the work done by girls and women in the competitive field. Their performances, particularly over the longer courses, were far beyond anything seen in the past and several of them compared favorably with the best made by the stronger sex.

Schmidt, of San Francisco, around the breaker-swept Seal Rocks, a feat never before accomplished by man or woman. In sprint and middle distance swimming, records were claimed in many sections, and though it is impossible to give them due recognition owing to the absence of a controlling organization, figures make clear that America's fair natators now rank with the best in the world.

BELGIAN RELIEF.

Ninety-three cars of food and clothing are pouring in every day from all parts of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario.

Mrs. George A. Fawcett, of Middle Sackville, has collected 221 barrels of potatoes for the Belgian Relief Fund. The potatoes are of the best quality, and were donated by the farmers of Sackville parish. They have been shipped to the Relief Committee.

The most striking performance of the season was that of Elaine Golding of Bath Beach, in the championship race from the Battery to Steeplechase Park Pier, Coney Island, in August.
