## ATHLETIC

Strong Men's Contest.

Montreal, Jan. 22—Constable Cabana  
won a weight lifting contest from  
Dreare of St. Henry last night at Sob-  
ar Park by nearly 400 pounds. Cabana  
lifted a platform with 2,286 pounds of  
iron on it, while the best that Dreare  
could do was to lift 1,961 pounds. Cabana  
also lifted an automobile weighing  
more than 3,000 pounds.

## THE RING

Willard Besieged By Sheriff.  
Chicago, Jan. 18—Jess Willard, heavy-  
weight champion, was besieged in his  
home tonight by a sheriff seeking to  
serve a summons in a suit brought by  
the fighter's former manager.

Going to the second story of his  
home, Willard for three hours refused to  
answer the taunts and jeers of the sher-  
iff, who, becoming tired at length, called  
in four deputies. "My men will stay un-  
til Willard comes down or jumps out of  
a window," declared the sheriff.  
Meanwhile Mrs. Willard telephoned to  
the police, who refused to intervene when  
they heard the cause of the dispute, and  
the sheriff's deputies remained at their  
posts despite the zero weather.

## BASEBALL

War Tax on Admissions.

Washington, Jan. 21—An arrangement  
for the payment of the war tax on base-  
ball admissions was made yesterday at  
a conference of major league representa-  
tives with Daniel C. Roper, commis-  
sioner of internal revenue. Mr. Roper ex-  
pressed gratification at the "patriotic  
spirit" of the baseball men.

Player Limit Abolished.

Chicago, Jan. 19—Abolition of the  
player limit in the American League was  
announced by President Ban Johnson to-  
night. The action was necessary, he  
said, to protect club owners who face the  
danger of losing several players in the  
next draft for military service. He was  
advised that three members of the Cleve-  
land club—Roth, Harris and Klepper—  
had been placed in Class I.  
Under the new ruling the clubs will be  
unrestricted in the number of players  
they carry. In previous years the clubs  
were obliged to cut their roster to  
twenty-five men on May 1. President  
Johnson said he understood the National  
League would take similar action.

IN THE POLICE COURT.

In the police court yesterday after-  
noon hearing of the charge against W.  
C. Flowers of stealing a safety deposit  
box fitting valued at \$8 was postponed  
until Wednesday afternoon.

The five girls charged with stealing  
articles of clothing from different stores  
in the city were brought up and all five  
pleaded guilty. The six women charged  
with receiving stolen goods were then  
brought up. Two of them were mothers

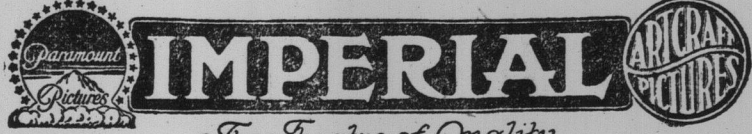

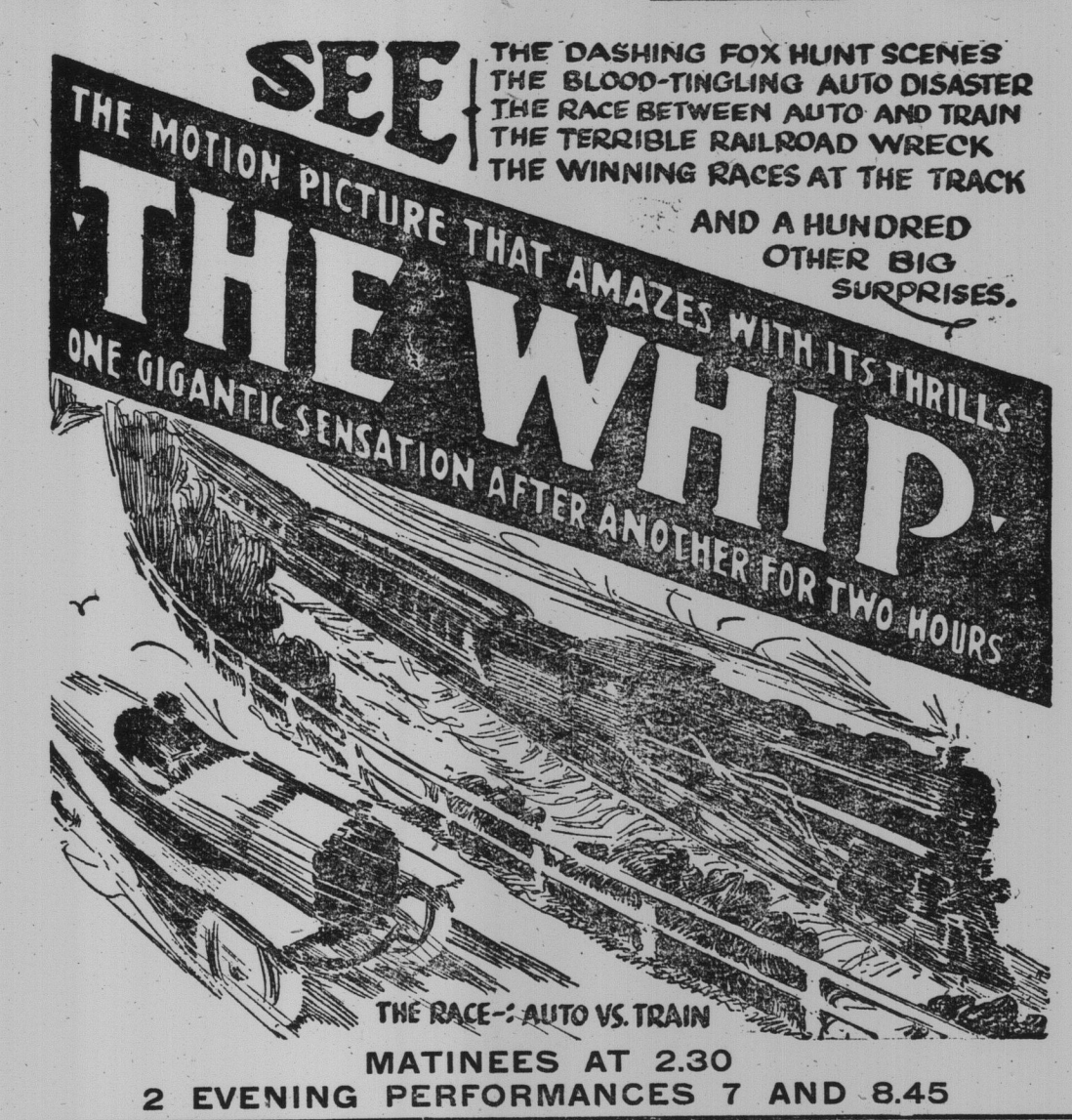
