NEWS OF THE MUSIC WORLD

A Talk With Wolf-Ferrari, Eminent German-Italian Composer

FUTURE OF THE OPERA

He Hears Caruso for the First Time in Sixteen Years and is Astonished at Wonderful Change—Hammerstein Says Harold Odette the Famous Tenor

(Times' Special Correspondent)

New York, Jan. 15.—Let all ambitious opera composers beware, for the future is uncertain. So, at least, declares Ermano Wolf-Ferrari, the eminent Italian composer who has just reached this country for the first time. Wolf-Ferrari has the right to speak. He is one of the foremost composers of his time.

However, many do not know this. New York did not, until three years ago, and then only through his oratorio "La Vita Nuova." Last season his one-act opera, "Il Segreto Sussurro," was presented at the Metropolitan Opera House and its musical charm instantly attracted attention to this thirty-year-old musician.

A few days ago the most pretentious Wolf-Ferrari work yet given here came before the public. It was "Le Donzelle Curiose" (The Inquisitive Woman) and its success was immediate. Beyond this, the artist said in describing one of the finest examples of opera buffa heard. Written after the style of Mozart "Le Donzelle Curiose" is filled with lovely melody and colorful orchestration.

Responding to the invitation of the Metropolitan management, Wolf-Ferrari consented to pay a first visit to a new land. Since his arrival he has been busy hearing what he termed the best opera he ever knew. Incidentally, he listened to Caruso sing for the first time in sixteen years. Friends who sat with Wolf-Ferrari in General Manager Giulio Gatti-Casazza's box say it was a treat to watch the composer's face. Caruso's improvement was noticed.

"Italian grand opera is undergoing a process of evolution," remarked Wolf-Ferrari. "It is difficult to tell what inspiration may accomplish, for genius goes its own way. What the composer of the future must do is to maintain a relative equality between the music and the dramatic action."

"The pity is that that deserving family does not come to many composers while they live. There is no defusing an opera just for the dearest of reasons. This has been convincingly shown by the popularity shown after a composer is dead. It is not until after the question of success hinges solely upon the public's demand for an opera? I think so. Trials alone show an unpopular work of an opera."

Wilhelm Backhaus, a pianist, whose American debut has been looked forward to by one of the best of the best, played for the first time in this country. His initial endeavor took place before a "New York premiere" of the Centenary of the New York Symphony Orchestra, which was given by the New York Symphony Orchestra, which was given by the New York Symphony Orchestra, which was given by the New York Symphony Orchestra.

His tone is full, he has power, abundant technique, and a fine sense of musical proportion. Although essentially a virtuoso pianist he is not lacking in poetic qualities. Backhaus' interpretation of Beethoven's "Concerto" was initial, and it won the sincere appreciation of the large audience. His second New York appearance in a recital gave the players broader opportunities to disclose his excellent artistic gifts and attainments.

News of Musical World

Block, the Czech tenor, and one of the mainstays of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, has just arrived here from Europe. He will give his first concert in Carnegie Hall here on the evening of January 18. Afterward he will make a brief concert tour of the United States and Canada before rejoining the opera.

The series of sixty-one free orchestral concerts just started in New York under the direction of Professor Henry T. Fleck, of the Normal College Music Department, are great successes. Schumann-Hofke was the first soloist. The world gave \$10,000 for the concert.

Paul Grappe, the young Dutch cellist, began his season's work in this country on Friday evening (January 12), in New York. He was heard in Carnegie Hall on the evening of January 13. Afterward he will make a brief concert tour of the United States and Canada before rejoining the opera.

Beethoven's "Eroica" concerto was played three times in New York last week. In this instance there was no fault to be found with the pianists who offered it, for the composition is one of the greatest ever written.

Geraldine Farrar has scored one of her most pronounced successes in the new Wolf-Ferrari opera, "Le Donzelle Curiose." The American prima donna not only looks charming, but her singing has captivated Oscar Hammerstein says he will give London forty-eight weeks of opera. Something of a schedule, it would seem. In a recent declaration he said he believed Orville Harrold was the best tenor in the world. He does not even except Caruso.
