ABOUT TO PUT THE BISHOP TO DEATH ON CROSS

Polish Sect Believed Visions Directed Through The Act

POLICE SAVE HIS LIFE

Saw Re-Claiming of the Wicked Men of Ledz and The Advancement of Their Beliefs—Leader Now in Hiding

(Times Special Correspondence) Ledz, Poland, Feb. 14.—Bishop Kowalski, leader of the Maryawity, a sect with a large following here, is in hiding following an attempt of his own people to crucify him. Fortunately the police came on the scene, just in time to save his life.

Some weeks ago the bishop noticed that his flock had dropped into a way of seeing visions, in which he, two of his priests, and Mother Kozlowa, supreme head, played chief part. The fanatic saw these four people under all sorts of conditions, but lately they appeared to be crucified, with halos round their heads, and then to rise again. Bishop Kowalski argued with them, but in vain. Mother Kozlowa lives miles away in a city of Plock, so the visionaries could not visit her. But they would Bishop Kowalski to say he always came to their visions and they would crucify him, since the vision always said so.

The bishop shut himself up in his house. They broke down the door and, in spite of his resistance, carried him off to a large open space behind the church. To his horror, he saw that a cross had been prepared. Two of his priests tried to show them their error, but in vain. The fanatic said they would crucify him, since the vision always said so.

A terrible fight followed, as many of the fanatic were armed. But the police got the upper hand at last and with the help of the military, arrested the whole crowd. Eight of the twelve ringleaders were taken to the police station, and the bishop was released from the crowd. Their victim collapsed when released from the cross. The priests begged for mercy, but the fanatic would be hanged after a day in the cells he sentenced to execute and to leave the city, disguised as a hawker. His refuge is a secret, as he says he cannot trust his flock.
