UPRISING IN CUBA IS MORE SERIOUS Five Thousand Negroes Are Now Said to be Under Arms There

FIGHT TO SAVE LIVES Two Supreme Court Judges Among Fourteen Prominent Men Who Are Carrying Rifles to Show Loyalty to Orizco and Cause

(Canadian Press) Santiago, Cuba, May 22.—The situation in Cuba is rapidly becoming more serious. It is now estimated that more than 5,000 negroes have taken up arms in the Province of Oriente alone. Havana, May 22.—Further reinforcements consisting of two companies of infantry and two batteries of artillery are expected here this morning for the Province of Oriente. They will assist the government troops already in that district, who number more than 1,200 men, in the movement to surround the negro insurgents under General Evaristo Estenoz and General Front. They are reporting at El Caney, El Cobre and San Luis in the vicinity of Santiago. The government has not received any further advice from the disturbed districts since yesterday. Headquarters, Mexico, May 22.—With death as their punishment for the complexity in a plot against revolutionary authorities, fourteen men, including two supreme court judges, and all prominent in the city of Chihuahua, are today proving their loyalty to Orizco and his cause by carrying rifles in his army as common soldiers under permission from that general. Since their arrest in Chihuahua, and their arrival here under guard, they have denied their guilt and insisted that they, at least, are revolutionaries. They were informed of the evidence tending to show that they had hatched and all but carried out, a plot to kidnap the secretary general of the revolution, the governor of the state, and the chief of police in Chihuahua, and to attempt to hold the city of Chihuahua for the federal government, without success. In addition to this, they were charged with being responsible for the recent bridge burning along the line of the Mexican Central. Their protestations of innocence of the charges, and their loyalty to Orizco were heard coldly, and they begged for an opportunity to prove it by fighting in the army. Otherwise they would have been executed.
