#### FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

RADIO DICTIONARY SELECTIVITY.

As applied to radio, it is the ability to select a particular wave length and to exclude other wave lengths. A receiving circuit, for example, which has a high resistance responds to a wide range of wave lengths and is consequently not very selective. High selectivity is secured in a receiving circuit when satisfactory reception of radio signals is obtained on a given wave length and signals having wave lengths differing by a comparatively few meters, either higher or lower than the given wave length, are excluded.

The function of a wave-meter is to determine when a condition of resonance exists in a circuit at a given frequency or to measure the frequency at which a circuit having certain established values of inductance and capacity will be in a state of resonance. A wavemeter consists essentially of a series circuit containing an inductance and a capacity, one of which is variable, and the value of both being known. The circuit is also provided with an instrument for measuring radio currents, such as a hot-wire ammeter, this instrument being either inserted directly in the circuit or electromagnetically coupled to it.

A type of mineral used as a detector in radio circuits and possessing the property of rectification, which allows more current to flow when a given voltage is applied in one direction than when an equal voltage is applied in the opposite direction. It is a sulphide of molybdenum, has a blue-gray color and a formation similar to mica as it can be separated into thin sheets. The opposing contact should be a fine wire resting on the surface of the crystal with a light contact. The degree of sensitiveness of this type of crystal is much less than that obtained with a good galena crystal.

The speed with which radio waves, light waves and radiated heat waves travel through space is 300,000,000 meters per second or 186.000 miles per second.

Sound waves travel through air with a velocity of approximately 330 meters per second or 1,083 feet per second.

COMMUTATOR "RIPPLE." When the brushes pass over the commutator segments of a direct current generator, a slight drop in voltage occurs when the brushes do not have contact with any commutator segment. If a circuit connected to the generator is used as a source of current supply to heat the filaments of vacuum tubes it will be found that the slight voltage variations or "ripple" will produce an annoying hum in the receiving circuits and cause serious interference with the reception of radio signals. The effects of this type of disturbance may be reduced, but not entirely eliminated, by the use of absorption circuits employing

TUBE SEAL As applied to vacuum tubes, it is a method of obtaining an airtight junction between metal and glass tubes used in the construction of high-powered, water cooled tubes developed for the transmission of radio signals. By means of this seal, a glass tube is joined to a copper tube in such a manner as to obtain an adhesive union which will withstand, without cracking, changes in temperature over a wide range and also permit a high degree of evacuation in the glass cylinder which encloses the active electrical elements of the therminist tube.

All frequencies above 10,000 cycles per second are known as radio frequencies. The mechanism of the average human ear, although extremely sensitive, does not normally respond to vibrations in excess of 10,000 cycles per second which has therefore been arbitrarily chosen as a convenient dividing line between inaudible or radio-frequencies and audible or audio-frequencies, the latter being frequencies of less than 10,000 cycles per second.


