

AT THE MADELEINE.

Great Honor Paid the Remains of Hon. Raymond Prefontaine in Paris—Notable Figures Present.

Paris, Jan. 2.—(C. A. P.)—Long before the hour set for the funeral services on Saturday of the late Raymond Prefontaine to commence at the Madeleine, large crowds had gathered in the vicinity, numbers of whom endeavored to gain admission to the church, but only ticket-holders were admitted. When the services began, the Madeleine was crowded. Among those present were: the British Ambassador and staff, M. Rouvier, Prime Minister of France; M. Doumer, President of the Chamber of Deputies; Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson; Secretary Griffiths, representing Lord Strathcona; Col. Hutchison, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, James Brodie Archer of Montreal, and Mr. Thomas, the French Minister of Marine. The Canadian Colonies in London and Paris were largely represented.

A very large number of wreaths were sent from England and Canada, French friends also contributing many. The service was conducted by the high priest of the Madeleine, assisted by Canon Wantel, and in the choir Mr. Flamondon of Montreal sang a solo. The service was the highest the Madeleine could give.

At the conclusion of the service, Hon. Mr. Lemieux and Mr. Hector Fabre, the Canadian Government agent in Paris, stood at the entrance and received the condolences of the British Ambassador, the Minister of Bulgaria, the French Government officials, and many other distinguished people. The coffin was removed to the front of the Madeleine, where M. Rouvier, Prime Minister, addressing the gathering, eulogized the services of Mr. Prefontaine to Canada, and not only to Canada, but to England and France. The sympathy of the French nation, said M. Rouvier, was with the Canadian people in their great loss. Mr. Prefontaine was a patriot, a man to be admired for his energy and perseverance.

Mr. Lemieux replied. Thanks to French Republic. Ottawa, Jan. 2.—Earl Grey Saturday afternoon received the following cable from Lord Elgin, Secretary of State for the Colonies:

"The funeral of Hon. Raymond Prefontaine took place this morning at the Madeleine, Paris, with military honors. There were present a representative of the President of the Republic, President of Chamber, President of Council, Minister of Marine, British Ambassador, and staff of embassy. Speeches were made by the Minister of Marine and Solicitor-General of Canada.

"The British Ambassador has been instructed to ask for an audience with the President of the Republic to thank him in the name of His Majesty the King and His Majesty's Government for the military honors and attendance of representatives at the funeral, and also to thank the President of the Chamber and Ministers for attendance and speeches."

GAMBLING IS LEGALIZED.

Bookies Will Now Have Free Hand at Toronto Woodbine.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—Saturday the following judgment was handed out at Osgoode Hall:

Rex v. Hendrie.—Judgment (C.) upon a case reserved by the Police Magistrate for the City of Toronto. An information having been laid against William Hendrie, the president of the Ontario Jockey Club, the owners of the Woodbine racing track, that he kept a disorderly house within the meaning of secs. 197 and 198 of the criminal code, a formal conviction was entered. The ground for the conviction was that, to the knowledge of the defendant, an enclosed place was set aside for betting, to which the general public were admitted. The privilege of conducting the betting operations was leased to one individual, who sub-let to some twenty operators. The point reserved was whether the club being an incorporated body, such place came within the act. Question answered in the negative and conviction quashed. MacLaren, J. A. dissenting. Per Moss, C. J. O.: The question is, can defendant be held responsible simply because he was a director and president of the club by which the privileges were leased or granted, and this was done with his knowledge and acquiescence? It is not shown that defendant personally promoted the action of the corporation, or that he did more than acquiesce. And nothing more should be inferred from his position in the club in order to render him liable as an accessory before the fact. Even in the case of a direct statutory provision against a corporation define or restrict.

IDAHO VICTIM OF BOMB.

Ex-Governor Steuenberg Killed for Unknown Reasons.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 2.—Frank Steuenberg, formerly Governor of Idaho, was killed Saturday night by a bomb at his home in Caldwell. A dynamite bomb had been placed at his front gate with a contrivance that exploded the bomb as he entered. Both legs were blown off and Steuenberg lived but twenty minutes.

There is no known reason for the outrage, but it is charged to some members of the famous Inner Circle of the Couer De Alene dynamiters, whom he prosecuted relentlessly in 1899 while he was Governor.

OCEAN LINERS COLLIDE.

Dover, Jan. 2.—The arrival here of the Red Star liner Vaderland from Antwerp for New York was delayed owing to a collision with the Buckland line steamer Barotse from Hamburg for the Far East. The Barotse was damaged above the water line, and the Vaderland's bulwarks were smashed. The latter took timber on board here for temporary repairs.

ENDS INSURANCE INQUIRY.

Manhattan Life Co. Last to Get into Committee's Limelight.

New York, Dec. 30.—With the adjournment of the Legislative committee on insurance investigation last night, the investigation of the last of the old line companies was completed. To-day, the last day of the committee's session, will be given over to the presentation of exhibits that heretofore have not been prepared for several companies, and these are so numerous that they will not be ready for the record, but after introduction by the witnesses would be marked for identification.

Yesterday the examination of the United States Life Insurance Co. was completed, and the Manhattan Life Insurance Co. was taken up. President Stokes of the latter company was a witness.

The last old line company discussed was the Life Insurance Club of New York. This appeared to be a system of securing insurance without agents. In the examination of its president, Robert Wightman, it was brought out that the system is antagonistic to the larger companies.

LOCAL OPTION WAVE

City of Owen Sound Leads the Way With Big Majority.

THE RESULTS ELSEWHERE

Out of 40 Municipalities Heard From 30 Have Given Good Majorities for the Bylaw—New Mayors in Ontario Cities and Towns—Emmerson Coatsworth Elected Mayor of Toronto Over F. S. Spence.

Owen Sound, Jan. 2.—The local option bylaw carried in Owen Sound yesterday by a majority of 468. The "cold water" mayoralty candidate, Joseph T. Joyce, was elected by 195, defeating one of the most prominent business men in town, Samuel Lloyd. All the local option candidates, seven in number, were elected with good majorities, and one of the anti-local option candidates, W. H. McClarty, was elected at the end of the list.

At Oshawa—A plebiscite for raising hotel license fee to \$400 carried by a majority of 339; and for the reduction of the number of hotels.

At Parry Sound—A bylaw to raise the hotel and shop license to \$750 a year was carried by a large majority.

At London—A reduction bylaw carried by 552.

Results of the Vote.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—Local option was voted upon in 62 municipalities in Ontario yesterday. Out of 40 places heard from, 30 have given good majorities in favor of the bylaws, including the City of Owen Sound, the first city in Ontario to accept local option. But it was not won without a big fight. Against local option are Petrolia, Barton Township, each with six licenses, and Arden and Drayton, with three. License reduction carried in London, Oshawa and Peterboro, and votes to raise hotel licenses carried in Oshawa and Parry Sound.

COATSWORTH IN TORONTO.

License Reduction Bylaws Fail to Get a Majority.

Toronto, Jan. 2.—In a total vote cast of 28,751, according to returns as compiled last night, Emmerson Coatsworth is elected mayor over F. S. Spence by a majority of 4,106. Every one of the six wards contributed to this result. The vote is the largest ever polled in Toronto, excepting only that of last year, when it ran as high as \$2,222, while the winner's margin is almost a record breaker, being second only to that of 4,500 given the late Warring Kennedy, when he first offered himself for election.

The council members elected were: Messrs. W. P. Hubbard, S. Alfred Jones, J. J. Ward, and John Shaw.

Thirteen Conservatives are elected to council, and ten Liberals.

Majority against license reduction of taverns 1,580; against reduction of shops 2,154.

Miss Clara Brett Martin was at the head of the poll for the Board of Education, with 11,999 votes.

The Hamilton Results.

Hamilton, Jan. 2.—Politics out considerable figure in municipal elections in this city. Only six Liberals were elected to the Council, yet this was two more than last year. Four Liberals, Ald. Eastwood, Wright and Dickson, are re-elected, and the new Liberals in the Council are Findlay and Lewis. Ald. Bowerman, E. Craig and Sullivan, Conservatives, were defeated, and the third new alderman is Birrell. Ald. Main again headed the poll, and as was the case last year, Ald. Eastwood was second. Ex-Ald. Findlay was third.

THAT HAMILTON MURDER.

Half-Brother of Victim Gives Himself Up At Flint, Mich.—His Remarkable Story.

Flint, Mich., Jan. 2.—John Horton gave himself up last night confessing that he had a hand in the murder of Mrs. Marie Hart at Hamilton, Ont., last October.

Horton says she was his half sister. She was killed because she had threatened to tell the police about himself and two Mexicans, his partners, who were passing counterfeit money.

He does not say that he did the killing, but admits having a hand in it.

Gave Himself Up.

Horton struck town Saturday night.

Last night he went to the county jail and told the officers that he wanted to give himself up.

Then he took from his pocket a circular gotten out by the police at Hamilton telling of the finding of the body of an unknown girl near that city on Oct. 9, and offering a reward for any information that would lead to the arrest of the murderers. The paper gave the description of the girl, but not her name as she had not been identified.

Threatened to Tell.

After the officers had read the paper, Horton, without further questioning, told his remarkable story.

He and two other men, he said, whose names were Manuel Lacressa and Juan Senson, both Mexicans, were operating last October in Hamilton and the vicinity, passing counterfeit money.

In some manner the girl learned of the guilt of her half brother and his companions, and threatened to tell on them.

Haunted By Fear.

Horton carefully refrains from admitting that he had any part in the actual murder, but admits that it will mean a long term in prison to him, if not hanging.

He says, however, that he is tired of being haunted by the fear of capture, preferring to give himself up and have the matter off his mind.

He will be held here until the officials at Hamilton can be communicated with.

Lord Strathcona's Views.

New York, Jan. 2.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal of Canada, who returned Sunday from London, where he went in April last, says:

"The new ministry is getting down to business, and I believe it will show great strength. The Colonial Secretary is a son of a former Governor-General of Canada, and he has been in India so that he is amply qualified. As to reciprocity between Canada and the United States, that is something which both nations must settle for themselves."

Strathcona in Canada.

Montreal, Jan. 2.—Lord Strathcona arrived here yesterday.

Canada's Prosperity.

London, Jan. 2.—Tributes to Canada's progress and prosperity are the feature of the new year reviews of 1901 appearing in the press.

One writer says: "This year Canada keeps booming ahead. Canada keeps wide open doors for the courageous and stalwart, and has not only attracted the best of our surplus population, but is receiving a constantly increasing number of immigrants from the United States. This bounding of the Dominion has touched Australia with a little envy. Australia is not developing as she should, and much blame is thrown on the labor organizations."

Honor For Canadian.

London, Jan. 2.—The New Year honors include only one recognition of the Indian staff. Among the names on the list is that of Major Alain Joly de Lotbiniere, R. E., superintending engineer, to be companion of the Indian order. He graduated from Kingston, Ont., Military College in 1883.

Over Dose of Laudanum Killed.

Peterboro, Jan. 2.—Edward Tognia, an employee of the American Cereal Co., is dead as a result of an overdose of laudanum taken to induce sleep. The young man had been working night-work. He was a brother of P. G. Tognia, postmaster of Douro.

Young Couple Drown.

Wakarusa, Jan. 2.—The finding of the bodies of J. A. Ritchie, aged 18, of Stonyham, and Grace Holden, aged 18, of this town in Lake Quannapottit yesterday disclosed a double drowning, which occurred during the night.
