FAST TRAVELLING.

C. P. R. Train Runs 112 Miles in 110 Minutes.

(Associated Press.) Montreal, Nov. 10 .- The Canadian Pacific made a record run to-day between Montreal and Ottawa, making the 112 miles in 110 minutes. The record trip was made by Lord Strathcona on a special train which left Windsor street station at 8.37 a.m., reached Vaudreuil, 24 miles, in 26 minutes, the rate being 53 miles per hour, and the run thence to Ottawa, 88 miles, was made in 84 minutes, at a rate of 63 miles per hour. Deducting ten minutes for stops and slow downs while passing through yards, the actual running time was 100 mins. for the 112 miles. The run was made on a heavy track, snow having fallen all night, which makes the speed all the more phenoninal.

MACARTHUR IN COMMAND.

He Will Personally Direct the Operations Against the Filipinos.

(Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 10.-Major-General Macarthur will personally direct the wigorous military operation to be directed against the Filipino insurgents, says a dispatch to the Herald from Washington.

Major-General F. C. Bates will probably be assigned to duty in Manila 'as the executive head of the military government in the philippines during the absence in the field of Gen. Macarthur.
