NARROW ESCAPE FROM BERGS Penned Gloucester men of

Labrador Schooner Quonnopowet flees by narrow channel.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., July 14.—One of the most remarkable escapes in the annals of the fisheries was related yesterday by Lapt. Daniel McDonald and the crew of Capi. Daniel McDonald and the crew of the schooner Quonnopower, of this port. The schooner left here June 9 on a fresh halbut voyage and proceeded to latitude 58, where halbut proved scarce. Captain McDonald sailed as far north as Northern Labrador, about 300 miles from the entrance of Hudson Bay. The vessel arrived July 2 and immediately set the trawls. Halbut were plentful and 20,000 pounds were secured in one day. Up to that time comparatively no ice had been seen. At midnight of July 2, however, the watch reported an enormous leeberg coming down on the vessel. All hands aprang on deck and manned the windlass to get the schooner out of the way.

The big berg crept down on them releptilessly, and the end of the berg struck the cable, breaking it short off. The vessel then drifted down on another big berg, where she grounded. A part of the cable was thrown over a pinnacle of jee as a mooring.

As far as the eye could reach the ice-field came closing in from all sides. There were bergs of all sizes, some as small as a small house, others covering several acres

amain noise, others covering several acres at their base.

To the fact that the vessel is fitted with an auxiliary engine and that one of the bergs was fissured the crew owe their lives. Through this slender avenue of open water the vessel was headed under power. When going through this fissure she grounded three times, one of the propeller blades was ripped off and the other two bent.

Ahead was seen a series of lagoons. By hoisting the foresail and mainsail the crew managed to sail through this sinuous passage, and in about 10 hours got to windward of the ice field.

All the fishing gear and 250 fathoms of cable had been destroyed and the total damage was about \$2000.

Capt. McDonald says he has been jammed two days in the ice, but never had such a close call as this.
