DESCRIPTION OF KIMBERLEY.

A correspondent who has visited all the threatened towns on the frontier between the British possessions and the Boer States writes to us as follows:—

Kimberley, 647 miles from Cape Town, and about 230 south of Mafeking, on the railway line, is a small town, the centre of the diamond industry, possessing the great mines known as the Kimberley and De Beers, and being practically the controlling centre for the diamond industry of the whole world.
