Randolph & Baker Have Given` MOTOR BOATS ARE a Ten Per Cent Increase in Wages, and Employes of Other Mills are Asking for the Same Advance

About this time last year the employes in practically all the St. John mills asked for wage increases varying from fifteen to twenty per cent. The demands were not granted, and the men quit work. The strike lasted for ing from fifteen to twenty per cent. The demands were not granted, and the men quit work. The strike lasted for some weeks, certain slight concessions were made, but in the end the men went back to work without having really achieveed their object. The only result of the dispute was a tie-up of the local industry and a loss on both sides. This spring the men will ask an increase of ten per cent. all around. The project has been in the air for some little time, but no definite date was fixed for making the demand. However, on Saturday last, Randolph and Baker announced a ten per cent. advance to on Saturday last, Randolph and Baker announced a ten per cent. advance to become effective this week. This action has led the employes of other mills to a more settled course, and the Stetson and Cutler crews have sent in the request mentioned. They have not yet received any definite reply. Employes of the other mills will adopt the same policy, and Cushings, Gregorys and other mill managers will receive notice from the men this week if indeed the demands have not been sent today.
