The funeral of Henry Saunders who was killed on the steamer Cacouna, took place this afternoon. Rev. R. A. Armstrong held a service at Chamberlain's undertaking rooms and the interment was made in the sailors' lot at Fernhill cemetery.

These directors were at a later date to elect officers. All the reports of the different officers were adopted.

**EMPRESS OF IRELAND MADE A GOOD RUN TO HALIFAX**

Due Here Early Tomorrow—Canada Cape Arrives—The Sardinian Sails Tonight.

The Empress of Ireland arrived at Halifax at eleven o'clock this morning, after an exceptionally fast run for this time of the year. This is only two hours behind the record time for the trip across. She will leave Halifax this afternoon and arrive here about five o'clock tomorrow morning and dock at eleven. She is bringing 49 first cabin passengers, 179 second class and 454 steerage.

The Sardinian, of the Allan Line, sails this evening for London and Havre with a full cargo. She also takes about a dozen passengers.

The Hesperian will get out tomorrow at noon. She will carry 35 second and 150 third class passengers.

The Canada Cape, of the Elder Dempster South African Line, arrived in port this morning and docked about eleven. She comes from Delagoa Bay via Demerara, where she loaded with sugar and then via Norfolk, Va., where she took on a quantity of oak logs. The sugar is for Upper Canada and the logs for Amherst. There is a full cargo of walrus, her seal and cod. She is not expected to leave before the 13th.

**NICK DASCOLIN LOST HIS REVOLVER**

It Was Loaded Like Its Owner, Who However Swears to Drink No More—The Patrol Wagon in Use.

Two prisoners occupied the bench in the police court this morning. One was a white man charged with drunkenness on Mecklenburg street. White had been annoying the residents of the officers Scott and Ross took him in charge. He had to be carried to jail, in court this morning the prisoner was remanded for two weeks.

Nicholas Dascaloin, an Austrian, aged forty-two years was before the court charged with drunkenness and with carrying a loaded revolver on Mill St. He was arrested last evening between 9 and 10 o'clock by Officers Covey and McParlane. In addition to the revolver the prisoner carried \$75.56 and a watch.

Two friends were also in attendance at the court and his honor learned that the prisoner desired to leave for home by boat tomorrow. He had been working and had earned sufficient money to return home.

A fine of \$4 or 10 days was imposed upon the prisoner, which was paid. His honor advised the Austrian to drink no more liquor. The man left the court, stating that he would not touch whiskey again.

Nicholas was not disposed to part with his revolver, but the court ordered that the weapon be confiscated.
