WOOD ASHES.

All our cultivated plants take kindly to a dressing of ashes. In fact, they can be applied at any time and anywhere with benefit, but especially would they benefit the permanent pasture if applied early in the spring. They would also be likely to benefit the corn more than the outer if the supply after the pasture has been treated is limited, then apply them in small quantities with the drill or by hand in juxtaposition to the corn citare before or after its planted. They not only supply directly needed food, potabl, with some phospheric said, but they also enable the plant to convert the starch into surgar and pass it along into circulation. So it may be said that ashes have a three-fold use-first, as a plant-food; second, as an improver of the physical condition of the soil, and, thirdly, as a chemical actor upon the starch.—Country Gentleman.

FATTING CALVES.

FATTING CALVES.

There is no mixture which so nearly and so successfully takes the place of whole milk for calves, says the Country Gentleman, as skimmed milk to which has been added boiled flaxseed, or oil meal in part. Boil one quart of flaxseed in six quarts of water, or in that proportion, and mik with an equal quantity of skimmed milk, and feed warm. Let the calf have its full of this mixture three times per day, if it will take so much food and keep in health—perhaps only twice per day. This feed may be begun gradually when the calf is a week old. As the calf increases in age, oil meal or one meal may be substituted for part of the flaxseed, and the proportion of grain to milk be increased. The calf may also be given access to dry outnoal, of which twill scarcely eat a harmful quantity.
