Leon and Viola McAvity were flower girls. They wore dainty dresses and hats of pink and white and carried baskets of pink sweet peas.


After the ceremony had been performed a reception was held at the residence of the bride's father, 67 Hazen street.

ROSSI JURY DISAGREED AND WERE DISCHARGED

Report That Nine Stood for Murder and Three for Manslaughter After Night Spent in Consideration.

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning the jury in the Rossi murder case, filed into court again and announced through their foreman, William C. Magee, that they had not reached a verdict and were still hopelessly divided—nine for the murder and three for manslaughter.

In discharging the jury His Honor expressed his regret that the jury had to spend an uncomfortable night. At the request of the attorney general, the prisoner was then remanded, and the court adjourned until next Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

The juryman sat up the whole night going over and over the evidence and discussing the various phases of the case, the most difficult point to decide being whether or not there was sufficient provocation for the killing to reduce the crime to manslaughter.

At one time during the night, it is said, the jury stood 7 for murder and 3 for manslaughter, and later, after some had altered their verdicts, the standing was, it is said, 8 for murder and 4 for manslaughter. One other changed his decision, making the final standing 9 for murder and 3 for manslaughter, but it was stated that these three had their minds firmly fixed their decision being unalterable and in fact one was quoted as saying, "If that man was hanged I would feel personally responsible."



CLOSING COTTON LETTER. By direct private wires to J. C. Mackintosh & Co. New York, Sept. 29—Early cables were easier on the near months, but the foreign market recovered later accompanied by cables to the effect that the Manchester operatives had given in to the master spinners and that there would be no strike. Our market opened unchanged, but the early dullness was soon changed into the activity and strength on the publication of a report by Messrs. A. Norden & Co., which estimated the condition of the crop at 65.4, against 70.8 last year, and the yield at 10,625,000, or only 100,000 bales in excess of the season just closed. This was followed by the National Spinners' figures of 66. A bullish government report on Monday seemed a foregone conclusion and a general readjustment of crop ideas in conformity with current reports seemed inevitable. While prevailing prices discounts a good deal the possibilities of further crop damage and a re-valuation of the cotton goods trade give time.
