BRUGHESI WILL BE A CARDINAL

Recent Rome Cable Says This Was Decided After Eucharistic Congress - Prelate Notified of Fact.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—A Rome cable to the Montreal Star says: The report circulated in Canada that Archbishop Brughesi, of Montreal, is to be made a cardinal at the next Consistory, is well founded. The Pope promised him the red hat after the Eucharistic congress in Montreal, but was compelled to delay his promotion at the last Consistory, owing to the prior claims of American candidates. As Canada and the United States are both included in the geographical denomination of North America, the Pope refrained from the simultaneous creation of four North American Cardinals, so he bestowed the honor only on Archbishop Farley, O'Connell and Falconio. The vernalization of Archbishop Brughesi will be announced when the date of the next Consistory is fixed. The Prelate has already been notified of his promotion, but is bound to secrecy.

How Story Leaked Out.

A member of the Redemptorist Order recently applied to the General of Redemptorists here and asked permission to come to Rome, his motive being that he wished to accompany the Archbishop, who was shortly to be created a Cardinal. Thus the story leaked out. Officials at the Vatican are now non-committal on the subject. The next Consistory will probably be held some time in November. The date has not been fixed, owing to the crisis in Portugal. The Pope, at the last Consistory, withheld the name of a new Cardinal created there but who, it is known was the parish priest of Lisbon. His name must now be announced.
