MONCTON COUNCIL GOES AFTER THE MILK DEALERS

A Boon of Two Cents a Quart Doesn't Look Business-like to the City Fathers.

Moncton, Sept. 8.—Chief of Police Riddell today received a telegram from Constable Chisholm, of Alberton, P. E. I., as follows:
"George McNeill, charged with firing shots at the patrol boat Nelson, left Alberton, P. E. I., today for America. Warrant out for arrest."
The Chief of Police acted promptly upon the information and Inspector Belliveau captured the man on train No. 199 this afternoon, and he is now under arrest here. It appears that the man left P. E. Island on a motor boat on Sunday, landed somewhere near Beaufort and boarded the train at or near Shediac, only to fall into the hands of the police here. McNeill is being held until an officer arrives from P. E. I.
Milk dealers in the city and vicinity were held before the council tonight to give reasons for the recent jump in the price of milk from thirteen to fifteen cents a quart.
The milk men give as a reason for the increase the increased cost of feed, labor, and utensils generally used in the business. An increase of two cents a quart by producers is also cited as one of the causes. Another argument advanced by the milk dealers was that railway shopmen were being increased in wages and the farmers had the same right to more money as the railway men.

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POTATO GROWERS ALARMED OVER RAVAGES OF PEST

If Chief Potato Producing Districts of New Brunswick Are to Prosper in Future New Strain of Seed Stock Must be Secured.

Fredericton, Sept. 8.—New Brunswick's principal potato growing country is faced with the necessity of bringing in to use before another season an entirely new lot of seed.
Investigations, which have been in progress for some time, have shown that only by the use of new seed from a district where the pests have not been prevalent can the present situation be improved, and steps in that direction are being taken.
According to unofficial statements, which come from an authentic source, the damage from this one pest alone will reduce this year's crop by about 10 per cent, and if unchecked would cause a loss perhaps of 25 per cent next year, and not less than 50 per cent of the yield would be destroyed by the season of 1921. It is understood that Prof. G. C. Cunningham, plant pathologist of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, who makes his headquarters here, has been largely instrumental in ascertaining the agent whereby the pest is carried and which has only recently been ascertained after a long period of research.
This agency is the spore, a green by which has been present in great numbers in infected districts this year and it has been proven that it is very largely responsible for the pest.
York, Carleton and Victoria Counties in New Brunswick as well as the Acrotooth district in Maine, are said to be the territories in which there has been the most severe infestation, and it is proposed to secure seed from the territory in this province from the nearby New Brunswick County and the Burton district of Sunbury County on the St. John River, where the pest has not been evident.
Prof. Cunningham, who has been making a careful investigation of the entire situation, expressed the opinion today that important progress has already been made in the eradication of the pest, and it is expected that within a few days an official statement in this connection will be issued.
The seed returned from visiting the experimental farms in Quebec, in connection with experiments which have been carrying on and also the New Brunswick Experimental Farm at Ottaw.

Political Views In Great Britain

Visitor from England Speaks of the Labor Struggles Across the Atlantic.

"The political situation in England is charged with high explosive. The great popularity of Lloyd George stems from the down grade, and nobody would be surprised if his present government throws up the sponge."
This is the opinion of Thomas Rose of Montreal who has just returned from England and was in the city yesterday.
"When I left England," he added, "they were just starting the Widnes by-election, and the opinion seemed to be that the battle would precipitate the fall of the Lloyd George government, and in any case would be a mile stone in the political history of the country."
Arthur Henderson, the labor leader, entered the right to test public sentiment on the question of the nationalization of the mines and the labor party is making the fight of its life to elect him. The constituency has always been Tory, and the nationalization of the mines was elected by about 3,000 majority. If Henderson could win in such a constituency it was said that Lloyd George would be morally bound to resign.
In spite of the opposition of Aquith and other Liberal leaders to nationalization the local Liberal Association decided to support Henderson, and it is a curious fact that some Unionist organs were expressing the hope that Henderson would win. In some quarters there seemed to be an opinion that the issue involved in the election was of more importance than the mere fate of the government. It was said that if Henderson, who is a strong advocate of political action as opposed to direct action on the part of labor, won the battle would be fought out on the political field; whereas if he was defeated or resigned the political leaders of the Unionist majority the advocates of direct action would be able to say that political action was of no value, and the political leaders of labor would lose their standing and the radicals who believe in strikes to enforce their demands would be thrown into a general strike on the question of nationalization.
"This latter course would, it was feared, lead to disorders and bloodshed, and possibly civil war. Anything is possible, for both sides are stubborn, but the moderate leaders of the labor party are endeavoring to keep the struggle on political ground."
This week the Trade Union Congress is meeting at Glasgow, and there will be many delegates who wish to compel the government to go to the country on the question of nationalization, and will favor a general strike to compel it to resign. Others will want a general strike to compel the government to nationalize the coal mines. "The decision of the congress will be fatal. If it decides for direct action there will be no compromise. At great public meetings Robert Smiley, the miners leader, was being hailed as the first president of the general strike. The general opinion seemed to be that the labor men would take a moderate course."
