Accept Reductions

Boston Only Branch Where Strike Is Ordered Over Wage Cutting.

New York, March 22.—All marine workers employed on heating equipment in New York harbor by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad have agreed to accept a reduction in wages, Henry Joyce, chairman of the marine department of the general manager's association, announced today.

All workers in boats of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, with the exception of the lighter captains, he said, had accepted wage cuts, as well as all hazzymen employed by the Central New Jersey railroad.

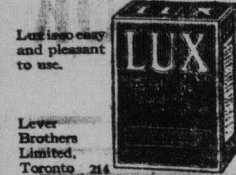
Strike at Boston.

Many Aspirants for Civic Honors Are Mentioned in the Streets.

Newcastle, March 22.—Although civic election day is almost a month away there is already rumors of candidates for both aldermanic and mayoralty honors. This will be the first election under the two year term for aldermen and those retiring this year are Alds. Crocker, Russell, Witsell and Jeffrey. Mayor Doyle, who has been in office two years will not be a candidate this year and for the mayoralty names most prominently mentioned are E. A. McCurdy, ex-Mayor Fisk and Ald. R. W. Crocker. For the aldermanic board, Alds. Witsell and Jeffrey will again be in the field and rumor has it that D. S. Crocker, Joe Mitchell, Charles Sargeant and several others will be in the field.

Fines Or Prison For Master Plumbers

New York, March 22.—Full seat-recess and fines ranging from \$250 to \$4,000 were imposed here today on nearly two-score of fifty-two master plumbers and corporations indicted last December in connection with the building trust union on a charge of violating the State Anti-Trust law. They were arraigned on pleas of guilty shortly after a jury returned a verdict finding Chas. A. Murphy, John A. Knight and the Wells and Newton Company guilty and clearing Frank J. Fee of the same charge.

FITZ-RANDOLPH CASE ENDS

Fredericton, N. HEAD LIQUOR BOARD

Halifax, N. S., March 22.—An order in council was passed by the Provincial Government this morning appointing Wm. R. Wakeley and Clifford Wood, of this city, and R. S. Froufoot of Pictou the commission to control the liquor trade to licensed vendors throughout the province. Mr. Wakeley is to be chairman, and the salaries are to be \$4,000 for the chairman, and \$3,000 for each of the other commissioners.

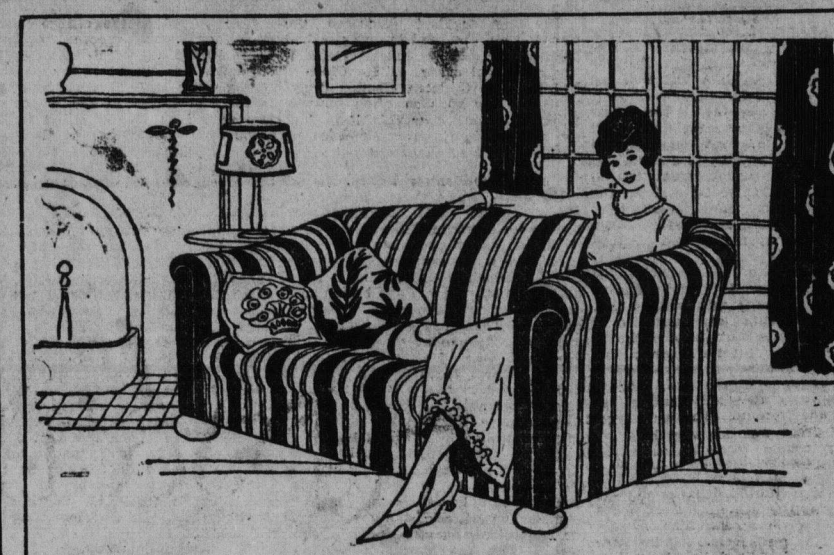
