The fair committee intend making it the best ever and with the assistance of other organizations the city it should prove a grand success. The rink will be decorated and booths are being erected. Although only organized early last season, the St. John Rowing Club has done much. It managed to get a lot of its members, Hilton Belyen, Robert Belyes, Charles Campbell and Greenville Campbell, to win New England championships, held at the Carleton Club, Boston last July, with the result that Hilton broke the record and won the 1000 yard race. Robert won the Intermediate championship. The Club was then active and aided greatly in sending Hilton to St. Catharines where he captured the Canadian championship, and made a grand record. St. John when he lost the International championship event by only two feet.

The Club intends to make rowing boom better than ever next year and with this end in view are starting right away to get some money. One thing is certain, the floating boat house and it is their intention to have one built. The fitting out of oarsmen in sending them away to take part in championship races amounts to a considerable deal of money and the Club members feel that a sufficient sum can be realized there. They will not have enough to build a boat house but will be in such a position that a canvas of business houses and citizens will not be necessary. The St. John Rowing Club has a very fine spirit and should be given every assistance from all lovers of athletics.
