HALLIGANS 6 BEAVERS 4

Kitchener Opened Home Stay with Loss—Needed New Pitchers
The Beavers dropped the first of a three game series to Flint here last evening by a score of 6-4 after an intense battle that had plenty of thrills and wound up with a rally that threatened to sweep the Halligans off their feet.

The game was notable for many things. It was the inaugural of twilight ball in Kitchener, the initial appearance of Pierce's Halligans on the home lot and it likewise established a league record for the length of time it took to go through nine innings. The game started sharp on time at six o'clock, and it was 8.55 before Andy Kyle fled to Shea for the third out in the ninth.

The playing of the Beavers also demonstrated to the home fans the reason for the weak showing of the Kitchener clan on their recent road trip. The team exhibited plenty of pep plenty of hitting ability and plenty of good defensive playing, but the real reason lay in the pitching department which was woefully weak and overworked, a department that requires immediate attention if the Williams crew expects to cut any figures in the chase for the batting crown. The inauguration of twilight ball was a popular move on the part of the management as was attested by the excellent attendance at last evening's fixture. Close to 1000 paid admissions were recorded which taken as a criterion of the attendance at future after-supper meetings should serve as a hint to the management to start all their home games at this hour with the exceptions of Wednesday and Saturday afternoon.

Lefty Wilogal was sent to the mound by Manager Beatty and as a result of his unsteadiness, received his release today. Wilogal would make an valuable asset to any team if only he corrected his penchant for giving free passes and bending players. During his stay in the box the Halligans only secured four hits off his delivery, but this effectiveness was wasted through his issuing eight bases on balls and hitting four men. These figures in the rungetting for the visitors who took every advantage of Wilogal's slips.

After filling the bases in the seventh Manager Beatty signalled to George to replace Wilogal on the mound. George had plenty of stuff on the ball, but like his predecessor, was given plenty to worry about during his three rounds on the slab.

On the other hand, Harry Howick, the former St. Thomas Canadian League, manager, carried on until the eighth, and while hit quite freely always tightened up in the pinches. Manager Pierce took no chance on his bats weakening and sent in Fisher to serve them up for the remaining two periods. The change nearly cost Flint the game in the ninth inning, however as Fisher found difficulty in locating the plate due to the darkness that was rapidly coming on.

In this inning, Wade plied out to Treffy. He hit Rip Harrison, passed Argus, Sharpe and Scanlon, forcing in Heanlon. George fanned and Kyle whose hitting and baserunning had been an outstanding feature of Kitchener's place, had the chance of his to end up the game in true story-book fashion, but was forced to pop out to Midget Shea, and the fans who at this time were on their feet and cheering madly, had to file out in disappointment.

Midget Shea at short for the visitors looks about the size of a pen standing up at the plate and both Wilogal and George had difficulty in putting them over for the youngster who is still in his teens. When one was finally put over, he slammed it out for a single.
