York County, a distance of eighty miles from the factory. Some of those farmers have a considerable distance to haul their beets to the station, and the freight they have to pay is eighty cents per ton. The following figures, based upon the actual results of the growers in Scarboro, assuming an average of fifteen tons per acre, show something of the profit there is in the business.
