# ONTARIO BEGINS FIGHT AGAINST INSURANCE COS.

Test Case Heard Against Canada Life in Action For \$25,059 Taxes-Considerable, Revenue Hangs on Decision.

Toronto, March 8.-The fight between the Ontario Government and the insurance companies over the Laxes which the companies refuse to pay, started in the non-jury assize court before Mr. Justice Middleton yesterday. power to collect the taxes, declaring the insurance pany is incorporated by statute of the Dominion of The great bulk of the evidence was documentary, and much of the time was taken by the M lawyers in argument. Only two witnesses were called.

Mr. W. M. Douglas, an officer in the Provincial reasurer's Department, said that the return made by the company showed premiums amounting to \$1,-562,770.11, on which the tax would be \$29,059.25. The tax had not been paid. Some forty companies made returns, said the witness.

In his argument, Mr. W. S. Brewster, K.C., for Pe plaintiff, pointed out that the act was not a new one, having been in force since 1899, the only difference now being that whereas the tax in 1899 was one per cent., it was now one and three-quarters per The companies had been paying since 1899. "This is not a tax on premium. It is a tax on the companies," said Mr. Brewster. The act says every urance company, and the only difference between the tax on banks and this tax is that the former was a lump sum, while the insurance tax was based on the gross receipts. "I think," he said, "that is the only fair way to impose a tax in this case, because if it were imposed on capital it might be found that a company with \$250,000 capital was doing far more isiness than a company with a capital of one mil-

Mr. Aglin argued that the Legislature had no right to tax a company on its gross receipts. He said that trust companies, railway companies and other corporations were taxed on capital.

PAN-PACIFIC EXPOSITION.

## FIRE LOSS OF \$196,807,914 PAID IN U.S. DURING 1914

The aggregate fire loss paid by insurance compan-les operating in the United States was \$196,607,914 last year. This was \$23,010,713 in excess of the pre-vious year's loss. The companies paid \$13,873,483 in dividends, an increase of \$359,507 over 1913, is spite of the enormous losses.

It takes the wheat crop of the United States to pay for the fire waste, as the net gain to the nation barely offsets the average annual fire loss. By wasting through fire \$500 a minute, \$30,000 an hour every hour of the day and night throughout the year, the nation thus cancels the net gain its wealth produced as described. That waste amounts to \$2.50 for every nan, woman and child in the country and 64 per cent if it can be prevented by known means.

The money value of the wheat at .84 cents a bushel is \$781,200,000. Against this may be charged the rental value of 54,000,000 acres of land at, say, \$5 an acre, or \$270,000,000; more than \$50,000,000 invested in seed; more than \$200,000,000 spent for labor and \$25.000,000 for threshing, a total of \$545,00,000. This leaves \$236,200,000. The annual fire loss in material consumed is about \$250,000,000.
