SYDNEY OLIVIER SOCIALIST, POET

JAMAICA'S NEW GOVERNOR ONE
OF THE BRILLIANT BAND OF
FABIAN WRITERS.

LONDON, April 29.—The appointment of Sydney Olivier, C.M.G., to the governorship of Jamaica shows the long distance we have travelled from the days of Governor Eyre. Mr. Olivier is one of the brilliant little band of Fabian Socialists, headed by Mr. Shaw and Mr. Webb, who have made their mark since they issued their famous manifesto essays. Mr. Olivier was Colonial Secretary from 1885 to 1894, when three occasions served as acting governor. Mr. Olivier has been principal clerk in the West African department of the Colonial Office. He has found it possible to reconcile his practice of benevolent autocracy with his theory of Socialistic communism as enunciated by the Fabian Society. Mr. Olivier is 47 years old, and entered the Civil Service in 1871. He has published a volume of "Poems and Parables."

DESPERATE CLIENT SHOTS FINANCIER

MAN WHO LOST MONEY IN SPECULATION RESORTS TO MURDER.

PARIS, April 29.—M. Emil Benoit, a wealthy financier, who was well known in Paris, was murdered in his private office in the Rue du Commerce this morning by a disappointed speculator, who fired six shots into his body.

Mr. Benoit was working in the office of the *Moniteur Economique*, a financial paper which he directs, when a client of five years' standing named Carriot called and asked to see him. Carriot was shown into the financier's private room, and immediately the door closed behind him the sound of revolver shots, followed by a heavy fall, was heard.

The clerks rushed into the room and found Carriot standing with two smoking revolvers in his hands, while Mr. Benoit lay on the floor, with six bullets in his body. The assassin was seized at once and disarmed, and M. Benoit was taken to the Hotel Dieu Hospital dying. An operation was performed, but the wounded man, whose lungs had been penetrated by the bullets, died while the surgeon was at work.

When questioned, Carriot said that he had entrusted \$10,000 to M. Benoit, all of which had been lost. He declared that he went to the office intending to shoot himself, but that the banker's cynical replies to his accusations maddened him, and he fired the shots in a paroxysm of fury.

It is stated that Carriot has been speculating heavily in the shares of the Rio Tinto copper mine, and that as he was unable to meet his liabilities, he had been driven to the desperate step of murder. Carriot was generally regarded as a man of very kindly and gentle disposition. His wife is an invalid.

FUGITIVE LOVERS DIE TOGETHER

BODIES FOUND IN TIBER WITH ROPE AND ROCKS ATTACHED.

ROME, April 29.—Two young Austrian visitors, Gustave Pfeiffer and Flora Kuhn, have met with a tragic end. In the latter days of March the Austrian Consul received a heart-breaking letter from Franz Pfeiffer, who lived in a small town in Bohemia, asking the Consul to trace her son, who had written telling her that he intended to throw himself into the Tiber, together with his fiancée.

The police were informed by the Consul and supplied with a note stating that the bodies of the missing couple had been found in the river bound together with strong ropes and with heavy stones tied at their feet. Their features were terribly distorted by the agony of death.

It has now been ascertained that the young couple, after taking the communion in St. Peter's in Rome, walked to the Tiber, where they spent two days. On the third day they took a boat and went up the river, landing after a little time and disappearing in a small wood near the shore.

During the night, after binding themselves with ropes and attaching strong ropes and tying heavy stones to their feet, the couple calmly walked into the river, and were soon carried toward the sea by a strong current. Before committing suicide they sent all their money and small souvenirs to their parents in Austria.

RAILWAY OFFICIALS PLOT WITH THIEVES

GREAT HAUL MADE IN RAID BY POLICE OF AN ITALIAN CITY.

TURIN, April 30.—The wholesale arrests of Italian railway officials implicated in the international train robberies, effected last week, were the outcome of repeated protests on the part of Scotch gentlemen, tourist Walter Neilson, of Ayr, whose portmanteaus were ripped open and plundered between Modena and Genoa.

The Turin authorities, after weighing the circumstances of several hundred complaints from foreigners about their missing property, became convinced that the culprits must be associated with the State Railways. A special commission was appointed to superintend the secret investigations, discovered that a coterie of railway men were in the habit of meeting together frequently in a reserved saloon of a popular Turin cafe, where they were always joined by a certain Scotch peddler merchant, who seemed to be in a flourishing financial condition. On being more closely watched the habits of these railroaders were noticed journeying often by express trains in which they had no business.

The arrests were made to begin with, including the suspected peddler. The arrested officials had in their possession a large quantity of money, with bunches of keys of every description for opening baggage. The police then raided their homes and seized a ton of silver ore and an unknown number of silver bars.

Nearly \$250,000 worth is expected to be brought up. There is the Willhelm der Schandha, a small schooner, containing a pirate's treasure. Then there is the Middleburgh, in 1898 there was a ton of silver ore and an unknown number of silver bars.

Among the abstracted goods recovered and are now being sold, a quantity of silks and satins, neckties, handkerchiefs, boots, patent leather shoes, coats, shawls of cigars and hats, also a wardrobe of priestly paraphernalia.

LIONESS TAKES A WALK

Queen of Beasts Fails to Live Up to Her Family's Reputation.

PARIS, April 29.—An amiable lioness which occupied a cage at Reims yesterday has disgraced forever the magnificent traditions of her kind.

She had been restive for some days and when her keeper was stooping in the cage she gave him a gentle push, knocking him over and sending him through the open door. She was somewhat bewildered by her sudden liberty, and in her excitement made a dash for the nearest building.

The child, a particularly bad tempered youngster, picked itself up and threw stones after her.

This caused the lioness to hurry, and in her terror she came into collision with an old woman, who was knocked over by superior weight.

Then a brave young man appeared in the way and said "Shoo!" whereupon the lioness trotted down a side street, causing great consternation.

She overtook a butcher's cart, and the butcher boy fled in terror, leaving his goods to the lioness, who stopped to enjoy a good round meal.

The butcher boy spread the alarm that an entire menagerie was loose in the streets. The timorous staff themselves up in the houses but a few of the braver spirits determined for the first time to enjoy the delights of big game hunting. They were led by an artilleryman with a drawn sword, and several men with revolvers and pistols brought up the rear.

The lioness, having finished her meal, strolled into the market place, to the consternation of the women shoppers, who were quite unaware of her pacific intentions.

Her pursuers did not dare to go near her, but first several ineffective shots from a distance. The mayor then came on the scene, and proposed to be the patron of a particularly furious beast. He called out a squad of soldiers, and they, with the keeper of the lioness at their head, came up with the beast in a blind alley.

When the lioness saw her keeper she ran up to him and rubbed her head affectionately against him, before trotting home at his side.

ABSCONDER AIDED BY SMUGGLERS

IS FINALLY EXPELLED—CORRUPTER ON REPRESENTATION OF FRENCH GOVERNMENT.

PARIS, April 29.—Fernand Bolles, a bookkeeper, whose manner of life caused his employers to give him notice, discovered in reading of the exploits of the runaway bank clerk Gailley that Gailley had no extradition treaty with France, and therefore resolved to seek a sanctuary in Cortu, whither he fled in October, 1905, with \$27,500 from forged checks, and with Amelia Bigouville, her sister and her child.

The police were brought to light in the Paris courts today. "I tried to be an honest man," he explained, but as my employer wanted me I resolved to be as dishonest as I could be." In a pretty little suburb of Cortu, handsome villas surrounded by palm trees and a world of roses, which has earned an unsavory reputation as the residence of many notorious characters from all parts of Europe, the party found a roomy villa, surrounded by a large garden, with a splendid view of the sea.

The landlord was a local notary. Bolles resolved to settle down, and bought the place for \$700. Then, supposing himself safe from pursuit, he sent his friends in Paris picture postcards, one representing himself and his companions on the veranda.

From these the Paris police found their clue. Two detectives visited the island, but one had to return to Athens to arrange for the expulsion of Bolles. Despite the intervention of the French minister, delay followed delay, and meantime the chief of the Cortu police, a friend of Bolles' and his companions on the veranda, for a consideration—with what took place. One pretext of delay was that the matter could not be dealt with while the Hellenic Parliament was debating the question of molesting foreigners, postponed till Parliament rose.

As the result of a formal complaint from the French minister, the chief of the police was in December removed from his position. Bolles however, was taken to a safe hiding place, and two policemen, and afterwards went to live with smugglers at Mantuthio, whom he paid dearly for his food and lodging.

Unfortunately, he became so annoyed at the way he was being exploited by the police and smugglers that he returned to Cortu, and in February, 1906, Bolles was expelled. In court today he said that he had been ruined by the smugglers. The French detectives calculate, however, that these "tips" did not cost him more than \$1,500, and believe that he has hidden away the remainder.

CANADIAN NORTHERN PAYS UP

Fine for Delay in Paying Taxes Paid

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 27.—After several months' deliberation the Canadian Northern today paid the State of Minnesota the five per cent penalty on taxes due on the gross earnings. It was the first time since the company was organized that it had paid the five per cent penalty for delay in paying the taxes.

The amount of the penalty handed over to the state treasurer by the railroad company was \$2,000,000, bringing the total sum of the taxes on the gross earnings for 1906 up to nearly \$14,000. Greatly as the company has been commended for its prompt payment of the penalty, but not until today did the railway company make any connections.

New President of Varsity

TORONTO, April 25.—After long deliberation the board of governors of the Toronto University today decided upon Robert A. Falconer, M.A., for the presidency of the University. The appointment was unanimous. Dr. Falconer is at present in Naples but it is thought that he will accept the appointment.

Blown to Pieces by Dynamite.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 28.—Samuel Johnson, aged 55, of Millville, was killed today by dynamite. His body was blown to pieces.

Rockefeller has transferred property, mostly unimproved, in and around Cleveland, to the value of \$700,000, to his son, John D. Rockefeller, Jr. The deeds were signed in New York by Mr. Rockefeller, and were filed late yesterday afternoon in the county recorder's office in Cleveland.

CHICAGO, April 29.—John D. Rockefeller made another princely gift to the University of Chicago in land valued at over \$2,000,000.

Deeds were filed in Chicago in the afternoon presenting the property to the University without a single condition. This gift of land makes close to a total donation of \$5,000,000 to the University of Chicago from its founder this year.

THE FACILITIES FOR MOVING THE CROP IN SASKATCHEWAN

(A. E. Boyle in Toronto Globe)

Writing from Regina, A. E. Boyle, The Globe's special correspondent in the West, deals with the facilities for handling and transporting the ever increasing wheat crop of the Province. In the course of his article Mr. Boyle says:

The grain-handling facilities of the Province of Saskatchewan do not multiply quickly enough to keep pace with the increased production of wheat, according to statistics which have been compiled by the Department of Agriculture. The shortage of cars has been a feature of the transportation situation at various times in every season, and the burden of the shortage has been aggravated by the fact that the elevators were not capable of accommodating the grain which was piled up in the elevators. During the period from 1901 to 1904 the aggregate capacity of the elevators rose from 2,378,000 bushels to 3,433,000 bushels, while the production of wheat increased from 1,566,000 to 15,000,945 bushels.

The production was gaining at the rate of 25 per cent and the elevator capacity was growing at the rate of 315 per cent. Even this enormous growth was insufficient to meet the demand, and blockades occurred at almost regular intervals, owing to the inability of the railway company to supply cars promptly. Since 1904 the product has grown to 37,040,000 bushels, an increase of more than 130 per cent. The elevator capacity has grown during the same time to 12,982,000 bushels, an increase of only about 37 per cent. The production of wheat has increased during the past two years three and one-half times as fast as the elevator capacity for the storage of the grain. The deficiency of the railway company to deliver the grain through a blockade. More elevators will be required at railway stations. In the earlier days elevators were constructed on the assumption that the larger part of the crop would be shipped out before the close of navigation in the fall. The individual farmers, especially those who live at a great distance from a railway line, will need to increase the storage capacity of the farm granaries and be prepared to hold their grain through a blockade. More elevators will be required at railway stations. Not an Unmixed Blessing.

The prospect of an immense increase in the wheat crop for 1907 is not regarded everywhere in the Province as an unmixed blessing. The transportation difficulties are considered at the same time, and the conclusion reached by some observers is that another heavy yield will mean a repetition of the troubles which have occurred this season. "What is the use," said one of these men a short time ago, "of our striving to increase the production of grain in the Province if it is not moved from the farms where it is grown? More imports should be attached to the amount of wheat shipped out each year than to the amount produced."

FRUIT BLIGHTED BY COLD.

Vast Region Suffers and Great Damage May Result.

CINCINNATI, April 27.—Freezing or close to freezing temperatures were general throughout the Ohio valley last night. It is feared that fruit of all varieties has either been badly damaged or entirely destroyed.

ST. LOUIS, April 26.—The unusually cold weather of the past week became wintry last night and early today and occasionally snow-falls fell. It is feared that fruit and vegetables have been considerably damaged.

WICHITA, Kan., April 26.—Small and large apple and pear trees were injured last night by frost and temperature that stood below the freezing point four hours. It is believed the loss will be heavy.
